



WHEREAS the St. John's Municipal Act, Section 153 empowers the Council to make rules and Regulations for regulate the parking of motor vehicles:

BE IT RESOLVED by the St. John's Municipal Council in regular meeting convened this 14th day of June, A. D. 1923.

(1) No person shall hereafter park a motor vehicle at any place on Water Street for a period of thirty (30) minutes.

(2) The following places are hereby set apart for the parking of motor vehicles used for hire: (a) The portion of Queen Street abutting on the Eastern and Western sidewalks thereof (b) The Northern portion of Duckworth street between Church Hill and Cathedral Street, (c) The Southern portion of Duckworth Street abutting upon that vacant piece of land known as "Clapp's Property" and extending to the Royal Stores Building.

Every person who contravenes or fails to comply with any provision of these regulations shall for each offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty-five dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

Play opened with the Guards making a sharp advance on Star territory which was quickly repulsed. After several minutes of indifferent play Clouston on a pass from Macklin, scored number one for the Guards.

When play recommenced the Star made a determined effort to equalize and paid a quick visit to Gushue, the Guard's goal keeper, but cleared. The Guards then took the ball down to Star territory and bombarded the goal, but Browne cleared safely.

Play then became general and was not very brilliant, being marked by too much high kicking and long shooting by both teams. The Guards scored their second from a kick by Macklin. Clouston followed in and Browne, in trying to fist the ball out, was blinded by the sun and missed it completely.

No further scoring resulted up to half time. On resuming play with the wind in favor of the Star, they tried hard to score, but the Guards were not having any and repulsed all attacks. The latter then began another offensive and after a splendid forward dash up the field, Quick had a shot at Browne which he gathered in his hands. The Guards forwards got on to him and forced the ball into the net.

A dispute arose over this, as it was claimed that Clouston had fallen on the ball and forced it in with his hand, but the referee decided in favor of the Guards and the ball was re-centered.

The Star tried heroically to cut down the lead but were unable to do so, and the final whistle sounded Guards 3, Star 0.

### LATEST

MOSCOW, June 29—Dr. Tikhon, former patriarch of all Russia, is free and at ease in Moscow.

Dr. Tikhon said yesterday he did not recognize the action of the church conclave in un-frocking him, but he admitted readiness to abandon his counter-revolutionary activities and recognize the authority of the Soviet Government.

The aged patriarch was released at noon yesterday. He said he wanted especially to deny that he had been put in the electric chair in prison and tortured. He said he had been well treated.

BRUSSELS, June 29—Premier Deunin succeeded yesterday in reaching an agreement with members of his cabinet who resigned on June 14, and all ministers will retain their portfolios.

Negotiations with France and Great Britain will be resumed and the Belgian reply to the German note on reparations probably will be drawn up on Saturday.

LAUSANNE, June 29—The evacuation of Constantinople in the event of peace treaty, but maintenance of contingent of foreign troops in Gallipoli as guarantee of fulfillment of the treaty by the Turks was said last night to be under consideration as one of the final conditions of settlement.

The report caused consternation in Turkish circles.

PARIS, June 29—Premier Poincare replying to Communist Deputy Berthoin, who urged resumption of relations with Russia, told the Chamber of Deputies yesterday that the Government's position on the subject had not changed since the Genoa and Hague conferences.

As a paramount condition of relations, he said the Russian Government must recognize debts contracted by previous Russian governments. Moscow announced that Ukrainian and Trans-Caucasian Republics have joined Russia in boycott against Switzerland, occasioned by the assassination at Lausanne of Vorovsky, their emissary to the Near East Conference.

### Drowned In The Humber

A sad drowning accident occurred on the Lower Humber, on last Friday evening, when Jeffrey Callahan, a resident of Corner Brook, lost his life.

Mr. Callahan, in company with others, was on his way up the Humber in a motor boat, and when Seal Island Rapid was reached, it was found the boat could not proceed against the current, and accordingly, a line was put ashore at a point further up to enable them to pull the boat up.

It was while engaged at this task that the current rushing down, struck the bow of the boat and turned her down river, with the result that the line was pulled away from her. Mr. Callahan's foot became entangled and in a flash he was dragged overboard. The boat was brought to land as quickly as possible, and the unfortunate man was taken ashore, but life was found to be extinct.

He leaves a family of six children. Interment took place at the Catholic cemetery at Corner Brook, Sunday afternoon.—Western Star.
