Sir John is said to have received the communica tion of his colleagues with considerable sang froid. He told them that he had already spoken to His Excellency and that the latter peremptorily declined to be a party to any such course, and that For Christmas. if they were not satisfied with his (Sir John's) declaration they had better at once interview the Marquis on the subonce interview the Marquis on the subject. Although not for a moment doubting Sir John's word of honor, the three French Ministers decided that they had better put themselves in the position of being able to tell their Quebec friends during the holidays (which they are now seconding among Quebec friends during the holidays (which they are now spending among their constituents) the actual state of the case from the fountainhead, and accordingly, they sought out His Excellency, who, is seems, more than confirmed Sir John's statement, intimated that he would refer the whole matter to England, and that he had no doubt as to his decision being confirmed.
