McIntyre of Grenville, and Thomas S Higginson, of Ottawa, both Conservatives gave evidence that Higginson promised to pay McIntyre an old account of \$25 to influence him, which the respondent's coun sel admitted as sufficient to void the elec

tion on a strict interpretation of the Liection Law. The election, consequently, is voided.

Much indignation is felt at the behaviour of Higginson, who has always passed for a Conservative, and who at the last election pretended to be a friend of the Reform candidate, Dr. Christie, the respondent in this case. Higginson admitted having turned against Dr. Christie shortly after the election, having been disappointment from Hon. Mr. Mackenzie. The determination of the Reform party there is to re-elect Dr. Christie, who has consented to stand again.

Higginson, it seems, applied for a post on the Grenville Canal immediately after the election, and Mr Mackenzie refused to appoint him. Dr. Christie said he had not asked Higginson to cupport him, but he professed to be a friend at that election, and he understood he was working for him.
