

Essentials of a Good Cement Silo-Roofless Stave Sile-Some Direc-

tions For Making Them. Silos built of concrete have been thirty feet deep, with the wall not more than six inches thick at the base and tapering to four inches at the top. the prisoner was found to be obstinately mute and the indictment was for high treason it was settled that his silence was equivalent to a convicin the wall to prevent the silage from tion and that judgment and execution should follow. This same rule applied to petit larceny and misdemeanors, but upon appeal or indictments for other feloples or petit treason, according to the ancient law, the prisoner was not deemed convicted; but, because of his obstinacy, he received "the terrible sentence of penance or peine" and was pressed to death.


