CERTIFIED SEED POTATO

STANDARDS FOR CANADA

(Experimental Farms Note.)

Owing to the wide interest now taken in the production of certified seed potatoes, our readers will appreciate the information which we are able to give on the standards for 1925 which govern the inspection of their pota-

The field standard remains the same as last year, viz., Blackleg, 3 p. c. Leaf Roll. (Curly Dwarf, etc. 2, p. e., Mosiac 2 p. c., Wilts, 3 p. c. Foreign, 1 p. c., providing that in no case shall a total of more than 6 p. c. disease be allowed. No field shall qualify for inspection unless separated by a reasonable distance (say two hundred feet) from any other potato field, or unless the latter field measures up to the above standard.

The tuber standard has been modified slightly this year to make the standard more clear to growers and include 5 per cent for Internal iety. The standard as it now stands is as follows

Wet Hot (bacterial) Late Blight and Dry Rot ......3 p. c. Common Scab anl Rhizoctonia (se-

Powdery Scab ...... Necrosis, Wilts, and Internal Discoloration, other than due to vari-

Providing that in no case shall a toal of more than 10 p. c. be allowed Not more than 2 p. c. of the tubers shall be foreign, badly off type or damaged by sunburn, cuts, cracks, bruises, insects etc.

No frost injury shall be allowed, Not more than 5 p. c. by weight of he tubers shall be below three oun-

thre can be 10 p. c. of rot, or 10 p. c. of Powdery Scab or 10 p. c. of severe made up of some of each of these diseases, providing there is not more of each disease than stated in the standard. Common Scab and Rhizoctonia severe-5 p. c., does not mean that 5 5 p. c. of the tubers shall be covered with large scab grading; but it does admit of 5 p. c. of tubers showing enough spots to be considered sev ere but which could have passed the person at the grader unnoticed. Occa sional small spots of scab not readily apaprent on casual examination are not considered in this standard.

The inspection service for the certification of seed potatoes is becoming more popular each year, and there were produced in Canada in 1924 over one and a quarter million bushels of certified seed potatoes, which was more than a 100 increase over the 1923 crop. The inspection system is carried on by responsible inspectors under the direction of the Dominion Botanist Erperimental Farm Branch, who are stationed at the following places throughout the Maritimes:

P. E. I., Charlottetown, S. G. Peppin. Plant Pathological Laboratory. N. S., Truro, W. K. McCulloch, P.

N. B., Fredericton, D. J. MacLeod (Pathologist-in-Charge), plant Pathoogical laboratory.

Completed application forms for inspection must be received by the Division of Botany, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, not later than June 30th., or inspection cannot be granted. Application forms may now be obtained from the above address.


