The Imperial Parliament will be dissolved Nov. 18th.

Halifax is to be lighted with electricity next Sunday evening.

The General Election in Newfoundland takes place next Saturday.

The Anglo-Turkish convention regarding the government of Egypt has been signed.

The report that the Servians have crossed the frontier into Bulgaria is confirmed.

Prince Waldemar, of Denmark, and Princess Marie, of Orleans, were married in Paris last Thursday.

Sermons against disestablishment were preached by the Episcopal clergymen throughout England last Sunday.

Sir Charles Tupper left Halifax Friday morning for Rimouski en route for England. He spent Friday afternoon at Amherst.

Forty-one deaths from small pox occurred in Montreal and its suburbs on Friday last, ten less than on the previous day.

The Jewish inhabitants of Warsaw are greatly incensed at action of the Russian Government in closing their schools.

Lord Powerscourt, at a recent meeting of the "Loyalists" at Munster, said that Home Rule is a fit subject for discussion.

Lord Dufferin, Viceroy of India, has received orders from the Home Government for the immediate despatch of troops to Burma.

Lord Randolph Churchill asserts that the war with Burma will probably result in the annexation of that country to India.

The French Troops in Annam have gained a victory over the Black Flags, and captured a strongly fortified town. There is great rejoicing in Paris.

Regular through freight trains commenced running on the C. P. R. last Monday. Through passenger trains will run on and after the 2nd of November.

The trial of Mr. Stead, editor of the *Pall Mall Gazette*, and his associates, for the abduction of Eliza Armstrong commenced Friday. It is evoking very little public interest.

The Persian Government has asked Prince Bismarck to induce the powers to declare Persian territory neutral, to prevent Russia crossing Persia in the event of a conflict with England.

Magistrates from various parts of Ireland were in consultation on Thursday with the Chief Secretary and Lord Chancellor of Ireland to furnish information for the guidance of the English Cabinet.

The situation in Ireland is very grave at present owing to landlords insisting upon payment of rents, and the inability of the tenants to comply, owing to the fall in the price of all agricultural produce.

The Irish Protestant Union has issued a manifesto denouncing the Irish National League for having for five years embittered Irish home life, coerced individual liberty and permitted the perpetration of outrages.

From the 1st to the 25th of the present month there were 1,380 deaths from small pox in Montreal and suburbs. The trade of the city is seriously affected by the epidemic, and no carnival will be held next winter.

The exports from Canada during September amounted to \$9,450,837, of which \$8,343,931 were in products of the country. The imports amounted to \$8,354,900, on which duty was paid to the extent of \$1,701,589.

The Marquis of Lorne, the Liberal candidate for Hantsport, was assaulted with rotten eggs while attempting to deliver a campaign speech at Brentford, a town seven miles west of London, and was obliged to seek safety in flight.

Mr. McLeod, the rejected of St. John, said after the election he was only numerically defeated. This was a statesmanlike remark. It is very evident that, if he had not been for the majority against him, Mr. McLeod would have been elected.

The question of the constitutionality of the Dominion Liquor License Act will come up before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council on the 11th November, on appeal from the judgment of the Canada Supreme Court. Mr. Budge, Deputy Minister of Justice, is in London in connection with the case.

The Imperial post office authorities are now advertising for tenders for the conveyance of mails from Coal Harbor, British Columbia, to Hong Kong, and from Hong Kong to Coal Harbor. The service is to be fortnightly, and is to be made by way of Yokohama both going and coming. This is regarded as an important recognition of the Canadian Pacific route.

It is reported that Riel displayed great agitation on learning that the Privy Council had affirmed the constitutionality of his trial, and that he expressed the opinion that he would not be able to escape. His counsel, Mr. Lemieux, has forwarded to the Governor General a petition asking the appointment of a medical commission to examine the mental condition of his client.

PROPOSED JOGGINS COAL AMALGAMATION.

The people interested in the coal, stone, lumbering and farming interests of the Joggins coal district have for some time been agitating for a railway from Macco's Station to the Joggins Shore, for the purpose of a ready place of transportation, as well as to provide transportation facilities to the Railway, during the six months when navigation is suspended.

An Act of Incorporation was three years ago obtained. The Dominion Government passed an order in Council granting to the Company second hand rails, and recently a second order has been passed granting instead of rails a cash subsidy of \$3,200 per mile.

Applications have been made to the Nova Scotia administration for help and although liberal encouragement was held out to the Company, yet the Government has failed to do anything.

The Company even offered to accept the royalty on the coal transported over the line, in excess of that of the coal mined in the area of a cash subsidy, but the Government, although apparently desirous of helping the undertaking, has shown itself too feeble to afford any help, even when it did not cost them a dollar.

The Company is, therefore, reduced to the necessity of raising money to carry on the work. It is not natural that the coal interest—the largest and most important one along the line—should in some way contribute to the work.

How shall this be done? It is proposed that the coal companies amalgamate their properties, and hypothecate them for the work. In other words, that the companies taking part in the Antwerp Exhibition. An examination of this document says the *Canadian Gazette* shows that Canada was represented in all by 170 exhibitors, to whom not less than 113 awards were accorded.

The remarkable degree of success attained by the Dominion is still more apparent when it is mentioned that the French colonies, whose exhibitors were very much more numerous than the Canadian, secured a far larger proportion of awards. The United States was represented on the occasion by only twenty-three exhibitors, who have carried off in all fourteen distinctions.

The Fish Bureau of Boston, which consists chiefly of wholesale fish dealers, has resolved in favor of the free exchange between the United States on the one hand and Canada and Newfoundland on the other of the products of the fisheries of these countries. Certain varieties of fish needed for consumption in the States are not found in sufficient quantities in their own waters. They require more herring, mackerel, salmon, trout and whitefish, and codfish and Atlantic than they produce. Mackerel caught in Canadian waters, larger than American, are also in demand. The specific duties here heavily on the cheaper grades of fish, and are said to amount to much more, to one hundred and fifty per cent.

What object Serbia had in view when her troops invaded Bulgarian territory, or what the final result of the ill-fated move may be, it is not easy to see. The conflict that must almost inevitably follow may be but the signal for a widespread conflagration that will carry ruin and desolation through all the old Turkish Empire.

Everything seems ready for a general outbreak. Turkey has her troops, apparently well armed and equipped, massed to resist attack upon all her threatened frontiers. Austria has been moving an army from the Danube frontier; the people of Greece are clamoring for another slice of Turkish territory and that country's reserves have been called out; Serbia and Bulgaria are almost at each other's throats; Russia alone, to whose machinations the original trouble has been ascribed, seems unprepared for hostilities, though her unreadiness may be no apparent real. It may yet be possible to prevent a general outbreak of hostilities, and confine the conflict to the two minor states, but the difficulties of the ambassadors' task have been greatly increased, and every day's delay can but render the chances of peace more uncertain.

A special despatch to the St. John *Globe* of Tuesday evening last contains a most satisfactory statement which should carry pleasure to every patriot's breast. The message was as follows:

Although he sustained no further damage than a good shaking, Sir Charles Tupper has at last had the pleasure of personally experiencing an accident on the Intercolonial, the mail train on which Sir Charles and Lady Tupper were passengers having left the track near Rimouski wharf, at which point they were to embark for England.

It was indeed fitting that a despatch should be sent with all haste, seeing the news were so promising. It is a true and welcome message described Sir Charles as having only had a good shaking up. But then it might happily be that some further serious symptoms might afterwards satisfactorily set in.

And then, what paper should have received that special despatch with so much union as the *Globe*? What a message from the gods to the *Globe* has a special that "at last" that wicked Tory should have had the experience of an accident on the Intercolonial. He has long had an immunity, but "at last" vengeance has successfully assailed him.

One little crumb of satisfaction remains. At this: There is a sea voyage before Sir Charles, and what a voyage! He has long failed to accomplish by only "shaking him up" the dangers of the sea may finish and complete by "shaking him down." Then will the *Chronicle*, the *Globe* and the *Transcript* have pleasure in analyzing a synopsis worthy of the Grits with a little G.

POLITICAL CHANGES.

Sir Leonard Tilley's convalescence has not progressed as rapidly as he could desire and he has finally decided to retire from the Cabinet. This event has called forth universal expressions of regret on the part of the press and the public. We are safe in saying that no man occupying a prominent public position in Canada is more generally respected by all classes and has fewer enemies.

Always the gentleman, even in the midst of the hottest conflict his attitude has always been moderate and even conciliatory. His course has done not a little to smooth the asperities and sweeten the bitterness of party fights; consequently one need not wonder that his opponents express as deep a regret as his friends at that continued illness that has compelled him to seek repose. His position to-day is a most enviable one. Voluntarily relinquishing a governorship in 1878, for the purpose of leading the forlorn hope of a ruined and shattered party, he to-day finds himself pre-eminently the man of the people, the recipient of such almost universal support from the people of his Province as is accorded to few public men. He has carried a small following from victory to victory through a campaign of seven years till to-day he can almost declare "where are my opponents?"

He to-day has the proud satisfaction of handing over to his successor the leadership of a most powerful and united party, and while we cannot expect it will remain long as it is, it is not without some satisfaction to the people of this Province that the receipt of the unqualified and enthusiastic confidence and support of the people of political rumors is as good as to the personnel of the cabinet.
