

## WILL GRIT POLICY ENHANCE FIGHTING POWER OF EMPIRE?

(Winnipeg Telegram)  
There is still no disposition on the part of the newspaper organs of the Laurier government to discuss the merits of the naval policy to which Canada has been committed. It has been said in opposition to this policy, that it is ineffectual, that it can bring no strength to the British navy and that it cannot, therefore, be a consequential factor in maintaining the supremacy of that sea power upon which the British Empire relies.

The government organs do not challenge this assertion. They cannot challenge it without challenging at the same time the wisdom of British naval strategy, which has staked the very existence of the Empire on the theory that in naval concentration there is strength and that in division of naval armament there is weakness.

Canada's naval policy is not in harmony with British naval strategy. It is utterly and fundamentally opposite to it. Canada's proposal is to maintain warships in waters from which British warships have been withdrawn. They have been withdrawn in deference to the theory that the power of the British navy should be concentrated in waters where the fight,

If there is to be a fight, will take place, and not in waters where in all human probability the Emperor's naval strength will never be put to a test.

It is apparent to the man on the street as it is to the naval strategist, that if Canada sincerely desires to strengthen Britain's sea power, which is Canada's protection as well as the United Kingdom's, her obvious course would be to strengthen the concentrated power of the British navy. But that is exactly what Canada, through her representatives at the Imperial Defence Conference, has refused to do. Instead of strengthening the British navy where it needs strengthening, we are building up a feeble naval unit in a part of the globe which is admittedly free from danger of attack. The situation, therefore, resolves itself into this simple question:

### CULATED TO PROMOTE THAT OBJECT?

Policy Not Effective.

We have the virtual confession of Sir Frederick Borden and Hon. L. P. Brodeur, that the naval policy adopted is not, the most effective that could be devised. They are on record as stating that in the discussion of this great question "the supreme consideration is the constitutional freedom of the state and to this, questions of strategy, no matter how important, must be subordinated." The issue as The Telegram sees it is embodied in those words, which, if they mean anything at all, mean that Canada has not considered the question with a view to effective co-operation with the British navy, but that her naval policy has been constructed within the narrow and arbitrary limits of a bastard nationalism.

If that is so, and Sir Frederick Borden and Hon. L. P. Brodeur have committed this country to a naval policy which means expense without effectiveness, and which would merely Ornament An Already Overworked Patrimony List.

surely that is something which every good Canadian citizen should take to heart. That is something also which should engage the attention of the newspaper organs that are so ready to deal in generalities and so reluctant to get down to facts.

These journals have clung long enough to the feeble plea that this Conservative member of parliament has said this or that, and another Conservative member of parliament has said something else. What Conservative members said or did not say is not related to the supreme question which turns on the strong probability that Canada has embarked on a naval policy in which effectiveness has been subordinated to prejudice.

Perhaps the government organs will favor the public with their views on this point. They have been eager to discuss a thousand and one irrelevant aspects of this naval situation. Let them now get down to brass tacks and tell the public whether in their opinion Canada is taking that course which will best ensure the supremacy of the British navy. It is on this point that the public interest is centred. It is upon this point that public apprehension must be set at rest.
