

New Brunswick to Fare Well in Supplementaries

Total Amount of \$23,470,316.65 Asked by Finance Minister White—\$1,500,000 Provided for Good Roads Movement, of Which New Brunswick's Share will be \$73,524—Generous Grants for Public Buildings in this Province.

Ottawa, May 21.—Supplementary estimates were laid on the table today. They total \$23,470,316.65, of which \$6,141,506.67 is on capital, and \$17,328,809.98 on current account. The largest single item is \$4,000,000 to provide for the construction, acquisition, leasing or expropriation of terminal elevation. Another interesting item is \$1,500,000 for good roads; it will be remembered that the vote which the Senate last year amended was for \$1,000,000. The proportions going to the Maritime Provinces are: New Brunswick—\$73,524.

Nova Scotia—\$102,870.
Prince Edward Island—\$19,584.
Other large votes are:
Halifax dock—\$500,000.
St. John harbor improvements, further amount required—\$300,000.
Additional branch stations for experimental farms—\$100,000.

The militia department gets an additional \$458,530 of which \$5,300 is for the construction of sidewalks fronting the government property at Halifax. For ranges generally there is a vote of \$50,000 and additional \$100,000 for annual drill and a further amount of \$50,000 for school teachers' courses for cadet work.

A grant of \$14,000 appears for the fund for Captain Scott, the hero of the South Pole.

Telegraph Lines.
Telegraph lines in Nova Scotia will get \$4,150 in revotes, in Cape Breton, Cape Negro Island and St. John's. P. E. I. Gets \$17,000 for half cost of reconstruction of telegraph lines jointly owned by the government and the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, and \$45,000 for improvements in telegraph and telephone service. The Chatham, Escuminac and Point Stupart line in New Brunswick gets \$900.

The mail subsidies and steamships' subventions are \$464,600, including the ocean and mail service between Canada and Great Britain—further amount required, \$400,000.

Preparation for a special post service appears in a vote of \$5,000 for two inspectors or supervisors of the system.
A vote of \$3,500 provides for a superintendent of the city and semi-staff post office in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

The impression is general that the four men to be named to the Upper House will be:
Hon. J. J. Foy, attorney-general of Ontario.
P. D. Smith, of Winona, former member for Wentworth.
Alex. P. McLean, former member for North Perth.
H. R. Cragin, of Windsor.
If this list should be correct it will be seen that three out of the four are from Western Ontario, and that two of the new senators are Roman Catholics. If Hon. J. J. Foy comes to Ottawa it is stated that he will be succeeded in the provincial administration by Mr. George Lynch-Staunton, K. C.

THE NAVAL BILL IN SENATE NOW

Liberal Senators to Hold Caucus To-day to Decide on Course to Pursue.

Ottawa, Ont., May 20.—The Naval bill made its appearance in the Senate today, being formally introduced by Senator Loughheed, Government leader. It will be taken up on Thursday. In the meantime the Senate Liberals will hold a caucus at which the action of the party in the upper House will be discussed. This caucus is scheduled for tomorrow morning. It is expected that the conference will reveal a division in the ranks of the Liberal Senators, the French Canadians being strong for the killing of the bill, half a dozen or more, mostly from Ontario and the Maritime Provinces, are anxious to pass the bill, and there are indications that the break will be wide enough to allow the adoption of the measure by a narrow majority.

Hon. Mr. Loughheed moved second reading for a bill authorizing the leasing of railroads up to two hundred miles in length or building a line up to 25 miles in length.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING
Charlottetown, P. E. I., May 20.—Jonathan Adams, aged forty, a prosperous farmer of O'Leary, was instantly killed by lightning yesterday when standing at his barn door. The barn was partially shattered. His wife had brought his supper to him from home, about two miles away. She and their young son were also in the barn and had a miraculous escape.
