The remains of the late Mrs. William J. Touchstone, who died at St. John on Saturday last, were brought to Cromocto by Valley train today and interment will be made in the family plot there. Deceased is survived by her husband, two sons and three daughters.

The Social Service Council.

The Social Service Council met last night but only routine business was transacted. During the meeting Miss Peterson, the Victorian nurse, gave her report on the work she had done during the month, which included 193 visits, 150 of which were nursing visits, 7 child welfare cases and 26 cases. The report was indeed very gratifying and it showed that Miss Peterson worked on an average of ten hours a day.

Fined for Game Law Violations.

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon returned last evening from Edmundston, where he had been prosecuting in two cases of violations of the game law which appeared before Magistrate J. B. McDonald of that town. The offences consisted of having a rifle in a lumber camp and killing moose in closed season. Convictions were secured in both and fines totaling \$145 were imposed by the magistrate.

Boston Train Service.

Effective April 26th, the day service between St. John and Boston, and vice versa, will be restored. Until general change of time May 2nd, the morning train leaving St. John at 7:40 local time will run through to Vancoboro and connect with the Maine Central and Boston and Maine Railway for Boston. Coming from Boston connections will be made at Vancoboro and the express will reach St. John at 10:45 p. m. instead of 10:00 p. m. the time of arrival of McAdam express under winter schedule.

To Reside in Millville.

Star of the East L.O.B.A., No. 33, met in the Orange Hall last evening for their monthly meeting and also to say farewell to one of its members, Mrs. W. H. Gregory, Past Mistress, who is leaving the city soon to take up her residence in Millville, where her husband is located. Dainty refreshments were served and the gathering dispersed with the singing of Auld Lang Syne.

WOODSTOCK MAY BE LOCATION OF MILITARY FORCE

Col. McLeod Writes that the Militia Council Have So Decided.

DELEGATION LIKELY TO GO TO OTTAWA

City Council, Board of Trade and Commercial Club Committee to Meet.

A meeting of the joint committee representing the City Council, Commercial Club and Board of Trade, who have been taking up with Col. H. McLeod, M. P., for York-sunbury, the matter of the return of a unit of the Canadian permanent force to Fredericton will be held tonight at the Board of Trade rooms when it is expected it will be decided to send a delegation to Ottawa at once to press Fredericton's claims.

A communication has been received from Col. McLeod, it is understood, which says that "so far as the Militia Council is concerned, they have practically decided in favor of Woodstock as the location for the permanent unit." It is further pointed out that "under the new situation the Militia Council is the final court of appeal" but Col. McLeod has written that he has had "the matter held up in order that a delegation from Fredericton may be heard."

Before the war an infantry unit had been stationed in Fredericton since the Canadian permanent force was first organized in 1885, but about a year ago it was announced that instead of infantry there would be a battery of horse artillery placed in Fredericton under the post-war establishment.

CITY CLUB WILL OPEN NEXT WEEK

Trustees Named at Meeting Last Night and Charter List is Closed.

At the meeting last night of the Fredericton City Club, the new business men's social organization, it was arranged that the club's quarters in the Dunbar Building would be ready for occupancy next week.

The club will occupy all the upper floors of the building as well as three rooms on the western side of the main entrance on the ground floor. The charter membership of the club was closed with seventy-five names and fifty other members will be enrolled as soon as they have been balloted upon.

R. W. McLellan, H. A. Smith and J. D. Tothill were named as trustees to act until the club has been incorporated, and Ald. J. Stewart, Neil, Ald. F. L. Cooper, Col. H. Montgomery Campbell, P. S. Watson, J. M. McLeod and J. T. Jennings were appointed a committee to take charge of the furnishing of the club, which promises to be comfortably equipped.

WHISKEY "PER" IS FOUND BY COURT TO BE DOCUMENT

Transfer of Goods is Brought About by Such Means, Says P. J. Hughes.

A. W. ENGLAND SENT TO CIRCUIT COURT

Charge for Forging Prescriptions for Liquor Will Be Tried Next Week.

The preliminary examination of Albert W. England, who is charged with having forged prescriptions for liquor, was concluded in the Police Court yesterday afternoon when the prisoner was sent up for trial at the York Circuit Court on Tuesday, May 4th, by Police Magistrate Limerick.

The Police Magistrate stated, when the court resumed that he had found in reviewing the evidence in the case that exhibit No. 2, one of the "pers" which the counsel for the defence had thought was not entered as evidence but which he thought had been held for identification, had been entered as evidence against the prisoner.

R. B. Hanson, K. C., for the defence, in addressing the court, stated that of all the sub-sections dealing with forgery, only one had any bearing upon the case. That was one, he stated, that referred to the forging of any document used as genuine, but he stated a prescription should not be regarded as a document. He therefore thought that the prisoner should not be sent up for trial, but dismissed.

P. J. Hughes, for the prosecution, stated that the sub-section which he had thought applicable was one which made an indictable offence of the forging of a document by which a transfer of property or goods could be made. Magistrate Limerick then ruled that the prisoner would be sent up for trial at the York Circuit Court on Tuesday, May 4th.

NEWMAN CLARK TO UNDERGO OPERATION AT ANDOVER JAIL

Preliminary Examination on Murder Charge Will Be Further Delayed.

ATTORNEY GENERAL POSTPONES TRIP

Gets Report Here that Case Cannot Go On Until Middle of May.

Newman Clark, the alleged murderer of Phoebe Bell, the 11-year old girl who was shot and instantly killed at Grand Falls on March 25th last, will probably have to undergo an operation at the Victoria county jail at Andover because of the condition of his feet, which were badly frostbitten when he was "kidnapped" from the hospital at Grand Falls ten days after the tragedy and escaped to Limestone, Me., where he was captured.

Attorney General Byrne arrived here last night and expected to go on to Victoria county to proceed with the preliminary examination this week of Clark and also Peter Ellis or Wood, who was named by the former as one of two men who kidnapped him from the hospital at Grand Falls, took him across the international boundary and abandoned him near Limestone. However, word came at noon today from Clerk of the Peace Stratton, of Andover, that a doctor had decided Clark would probably have to have at least one toe amputated because of the frost bites and that it would be two weeks before he could be moved to Grand Falls.

The Attorney General was therefore forced to postpone his trip for two cases to be taken up about the middle of May at Grand Falls.
