ELECTRIC POWER
To Operate New Road from Campbellton
THE CAPITALISTS
Details of the Big Project in Development of Grand Falls Water Power

The project for development of the Grand Falls water power, says the Telegraph, looms even larger than indicated by Hon Mr. Tweedie.
It includes not only the manufacture of ferro-manganese at the falls but also operation of the International railroad by electricity and the transmission of electric power down the St John River valley to be utilized for lighting and manufacturing as far as St John.
The International railroad is that now being built by Thomas Malcolm from Campbellton to Edmunston.
The whole project, here briefly outlined, it is calculated will involve \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 outlay and as a guarantee of good faith the capitalists interested have deposited \$50,000 with the receiver general of the province. Those financially interested are the United States capitalists who comprise the Electro-Manganese Company and they include Barton E. Kingman, of New York, and Frederick Sayles, of Providence (R. I.)
The capitalists have been investigating the water power at Grand Falls and conditions in general in relation to the projects they had in mind and are greatly pleased to find that all has proved so satisfactory and they are depositing \$50,000 as a forfeit in case they do not proceed with their work.
The Telegraph learns that the experts who have been carefully examining the falls have reported that the minimum horse power is 40,000, but during a large portion of the year there is many times that amount. The company proposes to expend a very large sum, estimated at \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 in development of the water power and providing the necessary electric plant etc.
It is understood the gentlemen back of this important enterprise propose to utilize the electricity for the manufacture of ferro-manganese from bog ores which have been found in enormous quantities in several counties of the province.
When the matter was before the legislature the premier explained that by taking the authority to lease the water power, the government would be able to deal with the subject in the interests of the province in a much more effective

way than if a company were given the power by the legislature which might result in tying up the water power as had been done by previous legislation. The result is looked on as showing the wisdom of the act of the government in this particular.
The possibilities of the development of this enormous water power are very great. Not only will there be sufficient electric energy produced for manufacture of the ferro-manganese but also for operating proposed pulp and paper mills and saw mills, while it is altogether in the range of possibility that the trains of the International Railway, now under construction from Campbellton to the St John River will be operated by electricity developed at Grand Falls. It is learned that negotiations to this end are already in progress.
The electricity can also be conveyed down the valley of the St John and utilized for lighting and manufacturing even as far as this city. It has been demonstrated that electricity developed by water power on a large scale can be used at so low a rate within distance of 100 or 200 miles as to put steam produced by coal entirely out of the business.
It is also suggested in this connection that there are good water powers near St John which have not been utilized to supply lighting and power in the city. The water powers at Musquash, Missep and Black River could, it is held, be utilized to enormous advantage and if an intelligent effort were made in this direction that much cheaper electricity both for lighting and motive power would be had here. While the quantity of water might not be as great as might be advisable, it is to a large extent made up, those who have looked into the matter say, by the great head which could be obtained on these rivers, it has been found that both at Musquash and Missep it would be possible to obtain heads of water of 60 to 150 feet. What could be had at Black River is not just known but there are preceptious banks there and probably an equally good head could be secured, and with the transmission of electricity from these powers to the city a great advantage to the people is calculated.
At the Grand Falls work, it is understood to be the American capitalists intentions to begin the work of development this year.

EDUCATION IN QUEBEC
To Be Generously Assisted by Sir William McDonald of Montreal

(Quebec Telegraph)
Sir William McDonald, Montreal's multi-millionaire and generous philanthropist, who has already given millions of dollars towards the higher branches of education, including \$3,000,000 to the McGill College University of Montreal, intends to extend his generosity in a more general way and assist elementary education in the Province of Quebec. This very important welcome news was communicated on Friday afternoon to the Protestant Committee of Public Instruction, by Prof Robertson, formerly Dairy Commissioner at Ottawa, but now in the employ of the Montreal millionaire philanthropist.

When the Protestant Committee met yesterday afternoon it was said that Prof Robertson, would come before them and deliver a very important message from Sir William McDonald, who was at the present constructing a large agricultural college on the Bedford property at St Anne's near Montreal which he recently purchased together with other properties, comprising 526 acres of land for the object.
Prof Robertson was the bearer of a confidential message from Sir William McDonald, consequently the press representative were not admitted. It was later learned however, that Sir William with a desire to assist Protestant elementary education in Province of Quebec, sent Prof Robertson to the Protestant Committee to unfold his scheme and request the assurance and assistance of the committee to carry out his proposition.
