

## APPROVED OF OIL BY-LAW

No Crude Oils to Be Stored in Any  
Frame Buildings.

Not More Than Five Gallons Allowed  
in Dwelling House.

Pump Specifications Will Not Be  
Ready Until Friday.

The chief business dealt with by the Fire and Water Committee last night was the approving of a new by-law prepared by the City Solicitor and Chief Ten Eyck of the Fire Department to govern the storing of oils. It was expected that something would have been done with the specifications for the new electric pumps at the beach, but it was explained that they would not be ready until Friday. Neither was the City Engineer prepared to report yet on the proposal to supply Dundas with water.

Regarding the new oil by-law it provides that no crude oils are to be stored in any frame building in the city limits. One clause provided that certain oils might be stored in a fire proof building, twenty-five feet away from any other building. For burning fluids, naphtha, benzine and others of this class the fire proof store house was to be a hundred feet away. It was pointed out that this would be impossible for some of the large hardware stores in the centre of the city to comply with and that portion of the by-law will be amended, probably to provide for a vault underground.

Not more than five gallons of oil, all kinds combined, is to be kept in any dwelling house and not more than ten empty oil barrels shall remain near a house or building. Five barrels may be kept in buildings approved of by the Building Inspector and the Fire Chief, who have power to inspect any building where oil is stored. Outside of the fire limits oil may be kept in any kind of a building.

It was reported that it would cost about \$800 to repair the old hook and ladder truck and the committee decided that the work would not be done this year. Some of the members thought it would be better to wait and buy a new truck.

## JAPANESE FROM HONOLULU.

Any Large Number Coming Liable to be  
Turned Back.

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—The Federal Government has received no notice as yet confirming the press despatches from Honolulu, stating that United States Senator Chillingworth and others are arranging to send to British Columbia in the near future several shiploads of Japanese, aggregating three or four thousand.

If the despatches are correct, and an attempt is made to land these Japanese at Vancouver, it is not improbable that they will be turned back, in view of the fact that they will not have passports from the Japanese Government.

The emigration law of Japan provides that passports obtained under false pretences as to destination are illegal, and if, as is suspected, the Japanese coming to Canada from Honolulu are brought there first with the intention of sending them thence to the west coast, the Consul will be asked to so inform the Mikado's Government and co-operate with the Canadian Government in putting a stop to this method of circumventing Japan's understanding with this country relative to the restriction of immigration to the Dominion.

## GERMAN EDITOR IMPRISONED.

Imitated Herr Harden, But Aimed at  
Wrong Man.

Berlin, Nov. 6.—Herr Brand, a journalist, to-day was sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment for calumniating Prince Von Buelow, the Imperial Chancellor, by intimating that he practised vices similar to those referred to in the Moltke-Harden case. Prince Von Buelow testified that the charges were "absurd and untrue," and also denied responsibility for Herr Harden's attacks upon General Kuno Von Moltke and Prince Zu Eulenburg.

The latter also was a witness, asserting his ignorance of the matter, and that he was innocent of the practices charged against him. Counsel for the defendant stated that his client now believed himself mistaken in his charges.

## NO RAILWAY STRIKE.

BRITISH EMPLOYEES AND COMPANIES REACH AGREEMENT.

Lloyd-George, President of Board of Trade, the Conciliator—Further Matters in Dispute Will Be Settled by Sectional Board of Conciliation.

London, Nov. 6.—The anticipated road strike, throughout Great Britain has been averted by an agreement drafted by David Lloyd-George, President of the Board of Trade, and signed late this evening by the chairman of the principal railroad companies and representatives of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants.

The agreement provides for the consideration of further matters in dispute primarily by a sectional board of conciliation representing the various grades of employees and the individual men representing the full membership of the society. If the board and these representatives fail to reach a decision the matter then must be settled by arbitration.

## WINDSOR BANK SOLD.

Canadian Bank of Commerce Buys Out  
F. J. Holton & Co.

Windsor, Nov. 6.—Arrangements were completed to-day whereby the business and good-will of F. J. Holton & Co., private bankers, will be turned over to the Canadian Bank of Commerce within the next few weeks. Ill-health of Mr. Holton is given as the reason, but it is known that for some time two of the chartered banks have been anxious to secure Mr. Holton's business.

## RAILROAD BONDS STOLEN.

Securities Valued at \$14,000 Have Disappeared From New York Office.

New York, Nov. 6.—The theft of \$14,000 worth of railroad bonds was announced to-day at the offices of Washburn Bros., brokers. The stolen securities included eight \$1,000 Erie first consolidated general lien 4s, due in 1906, and six \$1,000 Oregon Short Line Railroad Company refunding 4s, due in 1929. The particulars of the theft were made public except that the bonds were stolen from one of the firm's customers.

## KILLED ENGINEER.

MURDER IN CANADIAN WATERS IS UNPUNISHED.

The Terrible Act of Whaling Captain—Arrested at San Francisco and Tried—No Question of Jurisdiction Will Arise.

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—The question of Canadian or United States jurisdiction in the Arctic seas will not arise in connection with the arrest of Capt. Klengenberg, of the United States steam whaler Olga, for murder. Two winters ago the Olga was icebound off Point Barrow in the Canadian Arctic. Klengenberg, from all accounts, was a respectable mariner. He had his crew simply terrorized. He had a falling-out with his chief engineer, J. D. Paul, and one day stepped to the engine room and shot Paul dead.

As soon as the news reached Ottawa the Canadian authorities issued a warrant for the arrest of Klengenberg, but his vessel did not touch at any Canadian port, and when the Olga reached San Francisco the captain was arrested there. The trial lasted for some time, and when the case was remitted to the jury last week they returned a verdict, after six hours' deliberation, of not guilty. Word to this effect was received by the Government to-day. It appears that the decision of the jury was influenced by the fact that several of the witnesses who testified strongly against Klengenberg at the San Francisco trial had previously made affidavits exculpating the captain entirely, and declaring that he shot Paul in self-defence.

They further said that the affidavits were extorted from them by threats of personal violence from Klengenberg. However, the jury gave the prisoner the benefit of the doubt, and he has been liberated.

## SWEPT BY FIRE.

MONTREAL'S CONEY ISLAND PARTLY WIPED OUT.

The Flames Spread Rapidly—Greater Portion of Booths, Scenic Railway, Central Tower and Other Buildings Gone.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—Dominion Park, the great amusement place of Montreal, was half wiped out by a disastrous fire which began at 11 o'clock this morning. Before the flames had been finally subdued about 2 o'clock this afternoon, the greater portion of the booths had been consumed, and where before gayly decorated amusement buildings had stood there remained but a charred, blackened mass of smouldering ruins and twisted tin, which had been made to appear as an imitation of stone.

The buildings consumed included the scenic railway, the photo gallery, the snake charmer's booth, the shooting gallery and the laundry, the old mill, the ice cream parlor and part of the chute chutes. The great tower, the most imposing structure in the whole park, also fell a prey to the flames.

The cause of the fire is unknown. It started in the ticket collector's booth of the scenic railway, where a number of carpenters were at work at about 11:10. In five minutes, according to the statement of one of the workmen, the whole structure was a mass of flames, the fire gaining headway with incredible rapidity.

At a meeting of the directors of Dominion Park, held this afternoon, it was announced that the loss to-day's fire would amount to at least \$100,000.

The directors decided upon plans for rebuilding and orders will be given at once for the necessary construction.

## ORDERED OUT.

LIVELY SCENE IN A MONTREAL COURTROOM.

Abbe Luche Interrupted Judge St. Pierre and Told Him He Was Not Telling the Truth—Ald. St. Denis Awarded One Hundred Dollars for Libel.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—"Leave the courtroom," this order was given by Justice St. Pierre to a priest named Abbe Luche, who persisted in interrupting the judge when he was charging the jury in the Superior Court to-day. The incident occurred in the libel suit against Ald. St. Denis instituted against the Citizens' League.

Abbe Luche interrupted several times and was ordered by the court to be quiet, he paid no attention. When he said Judge St. Pierre was not telling the truth his Lordship ordered the priest to leave the room, which the priest did.

Ald. St. Denis sued the league for \$100 damages, and Abbe Luche became connected with the case through an open letter he had written to the league, saying Ald. St. Denis was a man devoid of principle. The jury awarded Ald. St. Denis \$100 damages.

## BREAKING RECORDS AGAIN.

Lusitania Steams 618 Knots in One Day.

London, Nov. 6.—The news of the Lusitania's remarkable performance on her official trials was followed to-day by the report that the Lusitania had beaten her own record for one day's steaming, covering 618 knots between noon Tuesday and noon Wednesday.

Passengers on the Lusitania, which arrived at Queenstown to-day, reported very favorable conditions for the big Cunard's creating a new record for the trip, and that the Lusitania's officers, with whom they had been in wireless communication, were sanguine of a great steaming feat.

## WALKED INTO THE RIVER.

An Unknown French-Canadian Drowned at the Sea.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Nov. 6.—Last night an unknown Frenchman, name not obtainable, walked into the tail race, near the ship canal and was drowned. He had just arrived on the Algoma Central train from a lumber camp up the line, and, stepping off the train on the wrong side, walked into the water. The current was rather strong, and although an effort has been made to recover the body, it has not yet been successful. It is claimed that the victim was demented, and may have walked into the water intentionally.

## A BIG POINT.

CLAIMS OF NOVA SCOTIA SHAREHOLDERS IN YORK LOAN.

Counsel Asks That They Be Set Down as Creditors Having Priority of Claim Over Shareholders—Will Determine Western Claims Also.

Toronto, Nov. 7.—The merit of claims amounting to \$500,000 was considered by Referee Mr. George Kappeler yesterday afternoon in connection with the settlement proceedings in the winding-up of the York County Loan & Savings Co. These claims are made by subscribers to York Loan stock residing in Nova Scotia and are set down as class two, being presented by Mr. C. A. Masten. The contention of these claimants is that they, having invested under certain conditions which they say are illegal, are not shareholders but creditors of the York Loan. This, if proven, will give them a priority over the shareholders.

The basis on which claim two is arguing this are: First, that the Ontario Government's authorization for the company's formation did not allow it to operate outside Ontario, and that in conducting business in Nova Scotia they were not in a position to accept money as stock subscription, but merely as to be credited to those giving it; secondly, that the concern had no legal right to do business in that Province, and, third, that the company had no legal by-law of its own allowing it to take subscriptions outside Ontario.

Mr. Stuart Lynn, manager of the Toronto Life Insurance Company and at one time connected with the York Loan, stated that there was a by-law passed by it to this effect. Mr. Masten holds, however, that if there were such a meeting passing upon it was not legally called, as no record could be found of the issue of a commission to go to Nova Scotia and take evidence. Much importance, it is thought, will attach to the finding on the pleas presented by claim two, as the settlement of the claims from Manitoba and British Columbia will largely be governed by this.

After a discussion, during which a motion to ask the general officers to declare the strike off was defeated, resolutions were adopted declaring the telegraphers' strike in the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies suspended from November 7 "until a full opportunity has been given the said telegraph companies to make good the assurances practically conveyed to us."

The strike for higher salaries was declared on August 12.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 36, not reserved, may be homesteaded by a person the sole head of the family, or an adult male over 18 years of age, the estate of one of the above, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.

An application for inspection must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else on filing declaration of abandonment.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled, or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.
