FOOTBALL CASE IN COURT.

London Sportsman: At the Reading county court Walter Rogers, a professional footballer in the employ of the Reading F. C., made a claim against the Professional Players' Union, but had anticipated the loss of his left eye. The proceedings were taken at the instance of the Professional Players' Union, of which Rogers is a member.

Several witnesses were called to show that the injury to Rogers occurred during the ordinary training hours. The defence was that when the accident happened training was over, and as it did not occur in the course of training no liability attached to the Reading F. C. Judge Harrington said he was satisfied on the evidence that the ordinary hours of training were over when the accident happened. Therefore he held that the accident did not arise out of the injury to Rogers as a professional footballer, and his claim would be dismissed.
