

Miscellaneous.

The London Weekly Register of the 11th says: "During the last few days three items of social intelligence have created quite a panic amongst certain persons of the ultra-Protestant persuasion in London. The first is that at the dinner table of the Catholic noblemen, the deviously popular Prince of Wales, and spoke to, no less a person than the Archbishop of Westminster; and, moreover—the horror of horrors—then to that and should be based upon the will of the people of the respective States."

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London, Aug. 8.—The Italian Government has agreed to pay that portion of the debt of the former Papal Provinces, which is held in France, and look to those provinces for reimbursement. Paris, Aug. 8.—General Fleury has issued a circular, calling for a purchase of additional supplies of horses for the army. COLLEENWOOD, Aug. 8.—A terrific fire has been raging in the woods back of this place, and the forest for miles is one mass of flames. Great fears are entertained for the safety of the town. Several farms have been burned, and the loss is estimated at £100,000. New York, 8.—Dates from Caracas Venezuela of the 22nd ult. state that foreign vessels are to be allowed the privilege of coasting trade between the ports of Venezuela. Porto Cabello will soon be invested by 4,000 troops. Langunary is partially blockaded. St. Domingo city advises that troops are deserting to the revolutionists, and alarm is felt at the progress of the Revolution.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—The Gazette contains a Proclamation giving the Queen's assent to the Extension Act between Canada and the United States. The Divorce Act is also sanctioned, and a discount on American invoices is authorized of 32 per cent. Parliament is prorogued until the 18th of September. New York, Aug. 10.—Gold 47. London, Aug. 10.—Her Majesty the Queen of England arrived at Lamer, on Saturday, on Saturday. It was a cousin of the celebrated Judge Lushington who died recently. The latter is still alive and in good health. Paris, Aug. 8.—Lord Stanley and Mr. Mowbray held a long conference at the Foreign Office yesterday, during which questions involving the present and prospective peace of Europe were fully discussed. It is said that Lord Stanley on behalf of the British Government expressed a desire for the maintenance of peaceful relations with all the Powers of the Continent, and that it is understood that the Emperor Napoleon and Her Majesty the Queen of England, enjoyed the amicable relations existing between the two countries. The fact that it is a guarantee of the future peace of Europe. The interview is understood to have been of the most satisfactory character and good results are expected to spring from it. Despatches announce the arrival at Constantinople of the Emperor Napoleon and suite. The Emperor has established his Court for a short time at the Palace.

H. M. S. "Herald," arrived at Plymouth, G. B., on the 10th ult., having on board the Hon. Mr. W. E. Gladstone, the son of King Theodore. He is 72 years of age and is described as being a very interesting and intelligent child. He appeared to be delighted with England, expressing his desire to visit the British Isles, and to go back to the active service which accompanied him, on going over the dockyard and arsenal at Plymouth, observing with regret that the "Herald," Theodore, you should have seen this!"

The City Council of Baltimore voted \$20,000 for the relief of the sufferers by the flood. \$15,000 to repair the streets and bridges, and \$5,000 for clearing away the ruins and rubbish. The Council also adopted a resolution of thanks to W. C. C. for his services in the relief of the sufferers. The Board of Trade are also adopting measures to aid the sufferers, and are living temporarily in the engine-houses and in the fire department.

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The Atlantic Cable Companies have decided to reduce, on and after September 1st, the tariff on cable messages between Valentia, Ireland, and Cape Cod, Nova Scotia, to three pounds for ten words, with five words additional allowed for the address, etc. The charges on land lines are to be added.

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PARIS, Aug. 7.—Queen Victoria landed at Cherbourg yesterday and reached this city last evening. She was received at the Station by Her Majesty the Empress Eugenie, and proceeded to the Tuilleries. The Queen will leave Paris tonight for Switzerland.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 6.—Jeff Davis arrived here last night. VINCENNA, Aug. 4.—The German delegates held a meeting in this city last night, at which speeches were made and resolutions adopted deploring the present exaltation of the German provinces of the Austrian Empire from the German relations with the Emperor, and protesting against the settlement of the question of German unity through the process of arbitrary annexation, declaring that all such settlements should be based upon the will of the people of the respective States.

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NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Stranger Scotia arrived to-day from Liverpool. Gold opened to-day at 47 1/2 to 47 3/4. NEW YORK, Aug. 5, p. m.—There was excitement in gold this morning, rise in which touched 48, and receded to 47 1/2.

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The Queen visited the Galata recently in company with a large party of the royal family. Her Majesty was received by the Duke of Edinburgh, who introduced to her all the officers of the ship. In the evening the Prince of Wales dined with the Duke, and the ship was illuminated.
