THREE MEN DROWNED.—Three
Frenchmen named Denis Lebec, Thomas
Hochet, and Joseph Jilbear, belonging to
St. Basil, Madawaska, were drowned in
Priestly Rapids, on the upper St. John
last week, while working upon John Kil-
burn's drive. It appears that they with
ten other men started to run the rapids in
a small scow, a rather venturesome un-
dertaking, and before the task had been
half accomplished, the craft was swamped
and sank to the bottom, leaving its occu-
pants foundering in the icy water. For-
tunately the provision boat, in charge of
Alex. Kelly of Kingsclear, was close be-
hind when the disaster occurred, and was
quickly upon the scene to render assist-
ance to the unfortunates. By hard work
Mr. Kelly and his companions succeeded in
rescuing ten of the party from a watery
grave, but the three named above sank
to the bottom before help reached them.

**Barl of Meath's Message to the
Christian Endeavorers.**

Boston, May 12.—A message to the
Christian Endeavorers from the Earl of
Meath, on the friendship between Great
Britain and the United States has been
received in this city, he says:
"At this moment the best means of
perpetrating friendship between America
and Great Britain is the subject upper-
most in my mind. I sometimes fear that
the very qualities which have made these
nations great should be a snare to the
people. Independence can and some-
times does degenerate into rudeness,
patriotism into jingoism, self respect into
arrogance, energy into vulgar push, de-
termination into obstinacy. Americans
and Englishmen occasionally meet in the
friendliest spirit, but shortly irritate one
another by ill-timed and odious compar-
isons. A wider knowledge and a desire
to learn rather than to criticize would
avoid such dangers. We at all events
can follow the Golden Rule whenever
British and Americans are brought to-
gether. This is my humble international
message."
