SUPREME COUNCIL STRONGLY RESENT INSULTS TO PRESIDENT AND UNION — GOVERNMENT ORGANS SEVERELY CENSURED — RESOLUTIONS ON MORISON MEMORIALS—PETITION URGED DEMANDING DISMISSAL OF P. T. McGRATH FROM LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL — SECRET SESSION ON UNION'S POLITICAL PLAN FOR NEXT FALL'S FIGHT—PRESIDENT COAKER PRESENTED WITH GOLD WATCH AND CHAIN WORTH A HUNDRED POUNDS.

BONAVISTA, To-day.
Yesterday was a busy day at the F. P. U. Convention. Three sessions were held. The Union presented President Coaker with a gift, a gold watch and chain, worth 100 pounds, as a token of its appreciation of his work on behalf of the toilers of Newfoundland. The Council severely censured the Chronicle and Plaiddealer for their outrageous attacks upon the Union and President, and strongly censured the News for publishing the alleged password of the Union. The Government and Premier came in for a severe handling expressed in resolutions which will be forwarded to you by mail, because of the insult hurled at the Country and the Union through the contempt with which the Union's petition for a General Election this fall was tendered by the Premier and his reflections upon the President. Governor Williams' action re the Memorial was dealt with by a series of resolutions which will be sent to the Press and the Home Government. The Convention strongly urged the distribution of a petition demanding the dismissal of P. T. McGrath from the Legislative Council. The enthusiasm of the Convention is indescribable. Last night a display of fireworks delighted the town. The night was beautifully fine and clear, although very frosty. At 8 o'clock the moving picture show started. Every inch of space was chinked. Sure Defeat Awaits Morris.

Fishermen are rallying for the fight next fall, but they are not rallying under the banner of the miscellany of the People's Party. They are lining up against that standard and are determined to oust the Morris-Morison Combine.

Four years of Morris and Morison have been too much for the fishermen, and they are determined to shake off the shackles of the People's Party as soon as they can.

They wanted to do it this fall, and they asked for a General Election, but Sir Edward refused their reasonable request. Next year the question will be out of his hands, and a General Election will have to be held, and then the fishermen will have the chance they were refused this year.

The District Council of the F. P. U. at Twillingate endorsed the action taken by President Coaker in reference to the two F. P. U. Memorials presented to the Governor the past spring, and CONDEMNED the action taken by the Governor and the PREMIER in connection therewith.

President Coaker in his address at Bonavista said in part: "The Election will I presume be held next Fall, when the Morris Government will have shown its contempt for the constitution of the country by prolonging their term of office six months longer than the constitution permits. ONLY A DYING PARTY, REALIZING THAT SURE DEFEAT AWAITS THEM would have been so devoid of honour as to remain in office longer than the law permitted. They have had their 'pennies' and their 'boodle', AND WILL NOW HAVE TO FACE THE WRATH OF THE ELECTORATE, WHICH WILL DEAL WITH THEM AS THEY DESERVE."

The most significant feature of all is that after President Coaker had avowed that "Morison will receive his punishment at the hands of Bonavista District next Fall"; after he had said "If you desire to see your Union and its wishes continually ignored, you had better place him (MORRIS) again in power, but I believe you have had enough of his (MORRIS'S) party, and his (MORRIS'S) rule, and with me will hold him (MORRIS) responsible for his (MORRIS'S) conduct towards the Union," he should have been accorded the ovation which was given him at Bonavista. Fancy the people

of Bonavista erecting arches, making banners, congregating with delegates and visitors in their thousands to demonstrate in honour of the Man and the Union against a Tory Government.

Could any words be more cogent and pointed to the Morris-Morison combine than the following taken from the message we published yesterday: "THE COUNTRY will now realize what the F. P. U. is, and yesterday's events will demonstrate to the country, and especially to the GOVERNOR and GOVERNMENT what is in store next fall for those who oppose the Union's wishes." And this demonstration took place at Bonavista, some four years ago the CHIEF stronghold of the present Government.

If anything more was wanted to show the contempt and disgust of the Fishermen for the Government, let our readers turn to the message we published to-day of the doings of the F. P. U. at Bonavista. Let them read, mark, learn and inwardly digest the contents of the message, and the most doubting Thomas will be convinced that it is all up with Morris and the Government.

What the people of the whole Island want is to oust Sir Edward Morris from power and to recall Sir Robert Bond to take up his old place as Premier once more. This is what the North wants. This is what St. John's and Conception Bay want. This is what the people in their thousands are calling for. With Sir Robert at the helm once more a feeling of security will prevail and the alarm and dissatisfaction of to-day will disappear.

New Marconi Agreement

With Nfld. Government.

MONTREAL, Dec. 14.
Mr. Laurier, General Manager of the Canadian Marconi Company, announced to-day that a new agreement had just been completed between the Newfoundland government and that Company. The Canadian Marconi Company has been operating five stations for Newfoundland government for some years past. The number of stations has now been increased to ten. The Canadian Marconi Company undertakes to operate them until year 1926, and will receive from the government a subsidy of \$4,500 per annum. Other considerations whereby Marconi Company's exclusive rights Newfoundland are continued until year 1926.
