### Remarkable Escape from Starvation, off Cape Horn

Extract of letter from David James (Master), of the late barque, "Colorado," of Glasgow. "Having lost our ship on Staten Island, on the 25th of July, and having saved neither stores nor provisions, we were then compelled to travel over the island for ten days, subsisting on nothing but shell-fish and seaweed. On the 19th of July we came across another shipwrecked party of seventeen, the surviving part of the crew of the British ship "Dunskeig," of Glasgow, fourteen having perished through exposure. Now, the ship was lost on the 22nd of June, and a lot of the cargo, consisting of Epps' Cocoa, was washed ashore out of the wreck. There was nothing saved except the Cocoa, and we, numbering twenty-five men, were kept alive on it up to the 20th of August, when we were rescued by the steamer "Mercurio," of Buenos Aires.

"Too much praise cannot be given to this Cocoa. We had a good stock of it there; we used it in a liquid state for drink, we also baked it on the fire, which kept us alive and warm for 6 weeks on this barren island, situated in a region of perpetual ice and snow."

## Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. Vienna, Jan. 27.

The Tageblatt's Constantinople correspondent asserts that Sultan Mahmud, and his brother, the ex-Sultan Abdul Hamid, effected a reconciliation at the Palace on the day before the coup d'etat.

Special to The Evening Telegram. BOSTON, Jan. 27.

One of the largest fares of fresh fish ever landed here in mid-winter, was brought in to-day by 38 sail of boats, totalling for the day 768,000 pounds, or 354 tons of cod, haddock and halibut. Retail prices dropped materially during the day.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, Jan. 27.

Dr. Friedman wants \$1,000,000 for American rights to his tuberculosis cure. German physicians strongly condemn what they call his non-ethical attitude. They go so far as to say that he is more concerned with the monetary than the humanitarian aspect of his discovery. Friedman has so far failed to carry out his promise to submit his culture to the Government. He has made various excuses for not doing so, but denies that there is any mercenary motive behind his action. He admits that he is waiting a reply from New York.

Special Evening Telegram. ROME, Jan. 27.

Pope Pius has contributed \$60,000 for the foundation of a special school at Frascati, near Rome, for young men, who are desirous of becoming school teachers. The school will be under the management of the Salesian fathers. All orphans of the Messina earthquake, who are being brought up at the expense of the Pope, have been admitted to this school. They will be trained as teachers. It is hoped that the efforts of the anti-clericals against religious instruction in public schools, will thus be counteracted.

Special to The Evening Telegram. LONDON, Jan. 27.

An uncensored despatch from Constantinople confirms the previous accounts of the revolution and murder of Nazim Pasha. The state autopsist discloses the facts that the bodies of those killed bore dagger wounds, as well as bullet wounds, thus throwing doubt on the assertion that the murders were unpremeditated. According to the Daily Mail the Balkan ultimatum will give four days grace to enable the Powers to devise any possible means to bring pressure on the Porte. The Mail also says that Colonel Jostoff, Chief of the Staff of the Third Bulgarian Army, before Chat-alja, who is now acting as military adviser to the Peace mission, will leave London for the front to-morrow and that all the Powers, including Russia and Austria, have given assurance that hostilities will be limited to the Balkan States and Turkey.

Special Evening Telegram. London, Jan. 27.

The special commission appointed by the Balkan plenipotentiaries, drafted a note to-day, notifying the Turkish plenipotentiaries that they propose to break off peace negotiations. The note was not submitted by the Balkan delegations, which held no meeting to-day. Instead they gave a luncheon to celebrate the Saint Day of Saba, the patron of the Orthodox Church. Many from the delegations are leaving London to rejoin their armies, expecting the resumption of hostilities. The note drafted is brief. It reminds Turkey that since the 6th, the sittings of the Conference have been suspended without Turkey moving. Events occurring in Constantinople are proof that Turkey's answer to the demand of the Allies concerning Adrianople and the Aegean Islands, will be in the negative. On this account, or unless the Turkish delegation offers new proposals, negotiations will be definitely broken off. The Serbian Premier gives a luncheon to the other delegations to-morrow, after which the note will be examined, and thus another day will be gained before forcing the question of re-opening the war. Rechad Pasha, in an interview to-night, said he regretted the obstinacy of the Allies, which he declared was not only against Turkey's interests, but also against their own.

### Shorthand Medal.

In connection with the recent semi-annual competitions of the Sloan-Duployan Shorthand Society, (Rams-gate, England), there is one Newfoundland success to chronicle. In the Class III Competitions, for the best shorthand note and transcript at 100 words per minute, the gold centre medal was won by Miss Lizzie Clark, of 25 Holdsworth Street, St. John's. A total of six medals in all were awarded, the remainder going to candidates in England, India, and the Malay States. Miss Clark is a pupil of Miss Nellie Vinnicombe, 42 Gower Street.
