Rhodes Scholar Killed in Action.

We record with regret the death in
action of Private G. H. Hayward, of
the 1st Royal Fusiliers, on April 5th.
His mother, Mrs. G. M. Hayward, re-
ceived the sad intelligence yesterday
from the War Office. Harry Hayward
was one of Newfoundland's Rhodes
Scholars and enlisted from Oxford at
the outbreak of the war. He shares
with Captain Mitchell, M.C., a brother
Rhodes Scholar, the glorious honour
of having given his life for the cause,
and was like him an ex-pupil of the
Methodist College. Nothing that he
might have been spared to do in after
years could have more fully fulfilled
the ideals of the great Empire-builder
whose benefaction he enjoyed. The
deepest sympathy will go out to his
bereaved mother in her affliction and
to the many friends whom the young
soldier's modest and engaging person-
ality won to him.

J. H. Parsons died Tuesday at 12.50
