Cab Overturns.

Yesterday morning the occupants of a cab came very near suffering a bad accident when the cab overturned and threw them out on the street. The cab went down Rennie's Mill Rd. and, turning swiftly into Circular Road, swerved sharply and overturned. The driver was caught before he could rise from the ground, after being thrown out, by the front wheel and pinned down. The four other occupants were also thrown out but neither of them were injured. The cab was owned by James McGrath, a returned soldier. A second accident occurred to the same cab yesterday, when McGrath was driving down Theatre Hill, immediately following the first overturning. The cab was rattling down the hill at a clipping pace and collided with great force with a motor car which was coming toward it. A man Howell, who was on the cab seat, was pitched to the ground, over the auto, and was picked up quite unconscious, placed in the car and rushed to hospital where his injuries were attended to. Howell regained consciousness at the hospital this morning.
