W. P. A. TAKING UP THE MATTER.

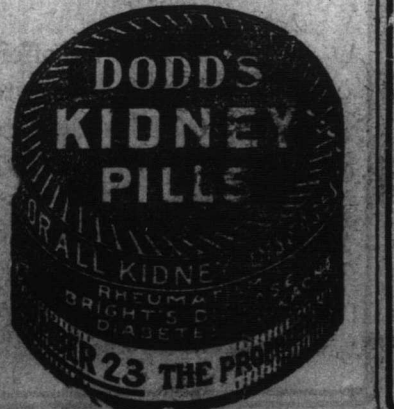
Miss Edith Haslam, who has lately arrived in St. John's from England and is at present a guest at Government House, is the Social Worker engaged by Lady Harris, wife of His Excellency the Governor, on behalf of the Women's Patriotic Association, to superintend Child Welfare in the Island, the work that the Women's Patriotic Association has adopted since the war ended. In Miss Haslam Newfoundland will have a most capable exponent of the work of Child Welfare, one who is thoroughly experienced and eminently suitable for the big task before her. She was trained in general nursing for three years in England and holds the Central Midwives Board certificate, and is registered nurse in Philadelphia. For 7 years she was engaged in private nursing in England, the United States, and during the war worked in Paris under the American Red Cross. On her return to England at the end of the war, Miss Haslam was appointed Superintendent of a new Infant Welfare Centre in London which she organised entirely and ran most successfully. At the beginning of this year she obtained the Health Visitors certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute. Miss Haslam is accustomed to giving lectures to mothers, and teaching first aid, home nursing and similar subjects; and though she only arrived here 10 days ago she has already addressed the wives of the Great War Veterans, the Cochrane Street Church Mothers' Meeting, and two or three other women's and young girls' Associations, in addition to which she has daily paid innumerable visits with Miss Kendall in order to get an idea of the condition of things and the greater needs of the people in the poorer parts of St. John's. It is Miss Haslam's opinion that in the young girls and future mothers lies the great hope of the work she has come here to do. Miss Haslam has been able to meet several of the doctors in St. John's by whom she has been most kindly received and has the great advantage of having gained their sympathy and co-ordination. She hopes still further to extend this by calling upon those whom as yet she has not had time to meet.

It is now essential to co-ordinate finally and officially the position of the Women's Patriotic Association in this matter with the Department of Public Health and the Government, as this is the only way in which the Child Welfare Work can hope to progress satisfactorily and with the strides that Newfoundland now anticipates. Miss Haslam has expressed her high opinion of the work which the Community Nurses are doing as organised by Mr. Gosling three years ago. But every day the work is increasing. There are now 1400 babies being visited, making it quite impossible for three Community Nurses to give each infant more than one visit per month, and no visit can be paid after the child is twelve months old. To meet this it would be necessary to have a series of infant welfare centres started in the town to which the mothers can bring their babies, thus relieving the pressure on the community nurses.

The Ideal Infant Welfare Centre is attended one afternoon a week by a doctor, whom the mothers are able to consult upon children's minor ailments, and where they are given instruction and help by the Superintendent and the community nurses in carrying out the doctor's advice. Mother-craft in all its branches is taught at the Centre by means of simple health talks and demonstrations. A cup of tea and a piece of cake, for which a small charge is made, gives the centre a home-like atmosphere, and a welcome is always assured. A Centre is not a charity organisation; nothing is given away free except the services of the doctor and the nurses.

It is such a Centre that Miss Haslam hopes to have started very shortly in two rooms, put at her disposal in the Department of Public Health, Duckworth Street, and she considers it most important that there should be at least two similar centres in other parts of the town which would be within easy reach of the mothers. When there is no room or building available for the use of a Centre, a school room or any suitable place can be turned to good account for a few hours when not in use, if the authorities will allow.

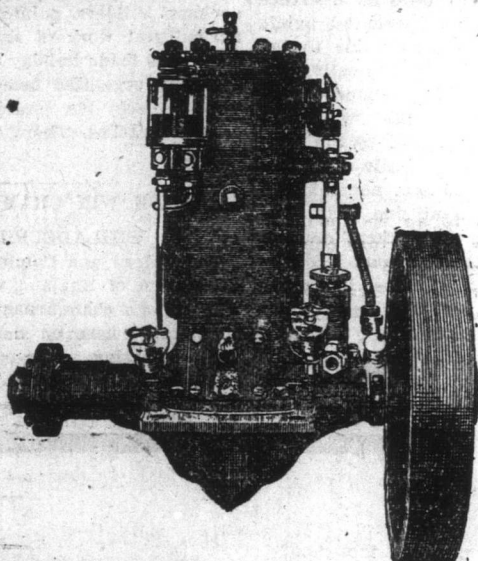
