Accused Acquitted.

PETER FINDS HIS COCK "NOT GUILTY."

After an all day and all night session, the jury which was trying the case of Peter Hiscock, charged with breaking an entrance to the King's Palace on the morning of Sept. 9th, returned to Court with a verdict of "Not Guilty." Ten witnesses were called by Mr. J. A. Barron, counsel for the Crown, six of whom were police officers. All of these declared that they could identify the prisoner. They were subjected to severe cross-examination by Mr. G. W. B. Ayre, counsel for the defence, who called six witnesses in Hiscock's defence, including the accused's wife and brother, and his brother's maid. The evidence of all these was to the effect that on the night in question, the defendant had been very drunk, and at the time he was accused of breaking into the cafe, he was at home and in bed. Both counsel for the defence and counsel for the Crown made eloquent addresses to the jury after which Mr. Justice Johnson summed up. He said that in case of any

reasonable doubt of his guilt, the benefit must go to the accused. At 12.30 a.m. the jury retired and returned a half hour later with their verdict.

Obituary.

MRS. LOUISA CANNING.
An aged lady, widow of the late W. S. Canning, passed peacefully away at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Geo. Whiteley, yesterday morning. Mrs. Canning had been feeble for some years, and her passing was not unexpected. To the last she maintained interest in public events, and few, even of the younger generation, were better informed in the history and literature of the Island and the Empire. Mrs. Canning led an active life, and was always most happy when most employed. To her, life was opportunity, and she offered little attraction. Victorian in type, she was Victorian at its best. Intensely loyal to King and Country, she loved alike Newfoundland and the mother-land. Her husband, a scion of the family which numbered in its ranks the great British statesmen, whose name he bore, passed away shortly after the fire. His hospitable home on the Signal Hill Road is still remembered with pleasure by many of the older generation. Its fall before the flames in the great fire of 1892 came as a crushing blow, for there was not a foot of its surrounding soil that had not been carefully and lovingly tended by Mr. and Mrs. Canning. A new residence was built near Quiddi Vidi Lake, but it could never replace the lost one. Mr. Canning survived but a short time. His widow with characteristic courage and energy endeavored to transform the wilderness into a garden, and met with a large degree of success. There and in the garden on Signal Hill, their son, Mr. Alfred E. Canning, the courteous and skilful Superintendent of Bowring Park, imbued his love for horticulture. There, first by the deceased lady, and later by her son, a pioneer Nursery was conducted, with much success. Not until age rendered personal supervision no longer possible, did Mrs. Canning retire, but to the last flowers were her inspiration and delight. She leaves one daughter, Mrs. Whiteley and two sons, Mr. W. F. Canning, Surveyor and Mr. A. E. Canning of Bowring Park. Also a sister, Mrs. Robert Simpson, and a brother, Judge Penny, both of Carbonara, in which town Mrs. Canning was born. After over four score years of activity and usefulness, the call came; she died as she would most have wished to die, and in feebleness of body but richness of intellect, "fell on sleep." The funeral takes place to-morrow from her daughter's residence.

Popular Cleric and Wife Celebrate Silver Wedding.

A very pleasant social evening was spent here at the temporary Parsonage, Sept. 29th, when a number of parishioners and friends met to celebrate the silver wedding of Rev. A. and Mrs. Shorter. Song, music and conversation made the time pass happily, a light supper was served and when the friends took leave they gave their pastor and his wife many kind and encouraging words and wishes. Mr. and Mrs. Shorter, who are deeply sensible of the people's kindness, were recipients of several beautiful and useful pieces of silver, which are much appreciated especially as they lost all their effects in the fire which destroyed the Parsonage a few years ago. There is a splendid new Parsonage erected on the site of the old, which by the strenuous efforts of some of the leading men, who work night after night, till a late hour, with admirable zeal, is practically finished. —COM.
