Some of the most enterprising and industrious of the city's merchants have their places of business on the "middle street" and these folks have been shamefully neglected in that New Gower Street has not been paved years ago. (By "paved" I certainly do not mean the mess of rough cobble stones which passes for paving on Water Street, but clean, durable, non-slippery paving such as is used on the business streets of many Canadian and American cities.)

The cost of paving New Gower Street would be negligible compared to the additional comfort, health and cleanliness it would bring to the business people and residents of that thoroughfare. (In Monday's issue I intend propounding some suggestions re methods of obtaining taxation from sources other than from the local taxpayer to cover such civic improvements as the paving of New Gower Street.)

Here was an act of friendship worthy of Damon and Pythias. Harry W. Haley, a bachelor serving in the British army, has as buddy Thomas G. Jones, an American, married and the father of a child. When Haley fell in action with a bullet in his leg Jones dragged him to safety at the risk of his life. This battle-debt, to be sure, was not an uncommon one in the army association. It is the uncommon way in which it was paid which gives interest to the story. When Haley, after his discharge, encountered Jones in Canada, a fugitive with a sentence for desertion on his head, he insisted on taking his place in a Leavenworth cell and had served most of the term when his identity was discovered.

Can self-sacrifice for a friend go much further than that? Whatever the ethics of the act may be, its spirit compels admiration. It shines out and illuminates the quality of comradeship in arms. Unfortunately military discipline is not amenable to such influences, and it is announced that the American soldier will have to serve his term notwithstanding. But it is good to have the example of devotion regardless of what casualties may think of the principle involved.—New York World.

The Other Side of the Case.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—There appeared in last evening's issue of your paper an article on a labor dispute between the Shoe Workers' Union and a certain manufacturing concern of this city. We must say that the article in question is misleading in every way, as the men employed by the firm in question were receiving a wage, which in our opinion, was not sufficient to supply even the necessities of life. As to the fact of the delegate not upholding the action of the men, we may say this is what happened. "On arrival here the delegate called a special meeting of the Union, and the first thing done at that meeting was the passing of a strike sanction. The next thing he did was the giving of financial aid to the men who were on strike. Both these measures were passed by the advice and with the full approval of the delegate. We think that this action of his was upholding the Union. The delegate afterwards called on the firm in question, and at our next meeting he laid before us the results of the interview. He said that the firm agreed to take back all the old hands without discrimination against any man, and further that in any case old hands were to be employed before green help was given work."

When this concern opened again some of the old employees were left on the street, whilst non-Union men were put in their places. We leave it to the public to judge as to whether this is discrimination or not. The result is that officials of the Boot and Shoe Workers' Union are walking the streets of this city, whilst men from Harbor Grace are given employment by this firm.
