Annual Speech Day.

OPERETTA A SPLENDID SUCCESS.

Bishop Field and Spencer Colleges held their annual Speech Day, and presentation of prizes in the Casino Theatre last night, before an assembly of people that packed the hall to its utmost capacity, principally the parents and relatives of the pupils. His Excellency the Governor and Lady Allard accompanied by Miss Viti Allard and Capt. Goodfellow were present and occupied seats in the box, while the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland, the Prime Minister, Hon. Tasker Cook, and J. R. Bennett Esq., a number of clergymen and the Executives of the Colleges were among the invited guests. The programme of the evening was opened with an exhibition of drill by C. Co. of the College. The squad was very proficient in their drill and the various exercises, when completed, brought forth rounds of applause. Mr. R. Withers, in his first appearance before the footlights, cleverly recited "Forty Years On" and was warmly received by the entire audience.

CHARMING OPERETTA.

Then followed the presentation of the Operetta entitled "The Enchanted Glen," staged by the pupils of Bishop Spencer College, and produced under the direction of H. W. Stirling, Music Master of the College. The story of "The Enchanted Glen" features Dame Grampus, whose tongue is the terror of the village, and who treats with great harshness Nora, an orphan whom she has adopted. The village girls interview the Dame on Nora's behalf and are soundly rated for their pains. Nora is sent to fetch water from a distant spring, but is misled by the "pixies" to the Enchanted Glen, and carried off to the Court of Queen Mab. Meanwhile she is missed, and the girls of the village set out to find her. They, too, wander into the Enchanted Glen, and are taken before Queen Mab and put on trial as trespassers. On learning the real cause of all the mischief, the Queen sends for the Dame, who is promptly shown the error of her ways, and eventually turns over a new leaf. The playlet was acted in three parts, the scenes being: Outside Dame Grampus' Cottage; The Enchanted Glen, and the Court of Queen Mab. The character personated by Miss Muriel Earle as Dame Grampus deserves special mention. Miss Earle acted a very difficult role and throughout the proceedings kept the audience in good humor, while Miss Audrey Chafe, as Nora, the orphan, and Miss Shirley Green, as Queen Mab were seen and heard to advantage. Miss Chafe has a very sweet voice, and her singing last night bespeaks well for a brilliant future. The various performers, consisting of Village Girls, Milkmaids, Fairies, etc., in pretty costumes, presented a beautiful picture, while the stage lighting effects added greatly to the beauty. The presentation was an unqualified success in every way, and all the performers are to be congratulated on their excellent acting and singing.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

Mr. R. R. Wood, Principal of Bishop Field College presented a very lengthy report in the form of an address, and showed that an excellent record had been made by the pupils in all branches of study. Miss Cherrington, the new headmistress of Bishop Spencer College, who has been only with us for a period of two months, captivated the audience with a very fine speech. As she had only recently joined the staff she was unable to present any actual report, but from what she had already seen of the classes she was very hopeful for the future, and a better lot of girls could not be found. For some minutes Miss Cherrington discussed the matter of physical training, and said it tended to make the girls stronger in mind and body, and made them more alert mentally, thereby increasing their efficiency and promoting knowledge among them. Without the physical training a weakness would grow in the girls' minds and they would be

unable to grasp things quickly. Physical training is an imperative necessity while girls are undergoing their studies.

GOVERNOR DISTRIBUTES PRIZES.

The distribution of prizes followed. His Excellency, and Lady Allard, the directors of the College, and staff took their places on the stage, while the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland occupied the chair. The prizes were presented to the boys and girls by His Excellency, and as each prize winner came forward to receive his or her prize, the head teachers announced the class or distinction under which the prize winner received the award. During the prize distribution proceedings, a little lot of Spencer College appeared on the platform and presented Lady Allard and Miss Cherrington with beautiful bouquets of Chrysanthemums.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Dr. Blackall in his report commented on the excellent results of the examinations and during his remarks paid a warm tribute to the good work accomplished by Mr. R. R. Wood, who has been headmaster of Bishop Field College for the past 14 years. He advocated the erection of a new college, to be used jointly, which would be for the betterment of the education of both boys and girls. A vote of thanks was proposed by Rev. E. C. Earp to His Excellency and Lady Allard for their kind attendance, which was seconded by Mr. Brian Dunfield and accorded by acclamation.

VICE REGAL APPRECIATION.

His Excellency arose, and in acknowledging the vote of thanks, took occasion to refer to the splendid reception accorded to himself and Lady Allard since their arrival in Newfoundland. "The warmth of the welcomes," he said, "would more than offset the rigor of the climate." Speaking on educational lines, he urged the children to stick by their studies and thereby win for themselves a proper place in the world. True, His Excellency said, there were a lot of our people who did not have all the education that they would like to have had, but it is the same all over the world. In His Excellency's closing remarks he said the boys and girls did not want to hear any talk about studies at this season of the year, and for a few moments concentrated the thoughts of all on a recipe for a favorite plum pudding.
