Prince Alfred Shot at in Sydney.

Our cable news to-day contains an item of startling intelligence. Prince Alfred, the Queen's second son, who has for some time been sojourning in Australia was dangerously wounded in Sydney by a shot supposed to have been fired by a Fenian. The further information which is appended, that the bullet did not touch a vital point, and that the Prince was slowly recovering will produce joy unfeigned in the minds of the many admirers of the manly and daring young sailor. But who would have imagined from the splendour and magnificence of his reception, in which each class of the population seemed to vie its utmost with another in doing him honor, that his visit would have had such a sad termination? Money was scattered with unsparring hand to prove the respect of the colony for the British Queen, and the admiration of the people for the Royal Captain; and the pageants in his honor were befitting the triumph of an ancient conqueror. We read of nothing in all the descriptions of the demonstrations which had taken place to produce the shadow of a suspicion, that disaffection towards the British Government, or hatred towards any member of the reigning family lurked in the bosom of any inhabitant of Australia. All appeared to be one gay scene of enthusiasm and rejoicing. But who can penetrate to the depths of that heart where Fenianism lies hidden, or who can predict the calamities the villainous possessor of it may produce? While others are admiring he is hating; their expressions of devotion but intensify his enmity, and while they are seeking the means whereby they may prove their devotion to order and good government, he is watching an opportunity to send a bullet on a fatal errand, and stretch his victim at his feet. The attempted assassination of the Prince is another proof of the wide-spread ramifications of Fenianism. It is to be found, perhaps, in every place where the Celtic race as represented by Irishmen, have penetrated, and, what is a sort of contradiction, as it becomes more impotent, it becomes more dangerous. Once it was bold and talked defiantly, it even ventured to make a stand in the open fields; now it sneaks about in disguise and with calm deliberation marks out its victims, and selects them for slaughter. It is necessary that in future judicial dealings with those implicated in Fenianism mercy should be forgotten. The Fenians practice none, nor will lenity towards them teach them to imitate a noble example. Is our country and other dependencies of the British Crown to be overrun with an organization of assassins like the dark realms of Spain and Italy; or is there to be fostered among us a generation of demons who bid fair to imitate the Thugs of India, make assassination a trade and train their children to it? Mr. McGee was murdered, the Duke of Edinburgh has been wounded dangerously, at whom will the pistol be pointed next?

THE MILITIA BILL.

The correspondent of the Hamilton Times thus gives the grounds of opposition to the new Militia Bill in the following condensed shape. First, that the bill is calculated to break up the volunteer force; secondly, that it is peculiarly a perverse, un-British and anti-Imperial policy to give the volunteer system, in a British colony, its death blow at a time when it is becoming the glory and strength of the Mother Country against foreign invasion; and thirdly, that enough of young men, the strength and hope of the Dominion, are now leaving for the United States without our adding a conscription to their reasons for leaving, to which I may add that the Government will, in the Tariff arrangement, it is said, give due consideration, and show the necessity which exists for keeping our own population at home, through the development of manufacturing and industrial enterprises and see that its Militia policy does not prove one of expatriation for our young men. To bring emigrants here from across the seas, while our own people are leaving for the States, either to get work or avoid the draft, does not seem to be a particularly rational policy. On the fortification question, Mr. Mackenzie's trenchant exposure of the unconstitutional procedure of our Government in asking for a lump rate at once of five or six millions expenditure, to be distributed over five years, without any details, estimates and information furnished to Parliament, while the Imperial Government, designing to spend twelve million pounds total on fortifications, submitted the separate expenditure of each year as itemized round to the most searching investigation by committees, with full details and estimates furnished before a penny was voted, has produced a powerful effect on both sides of the ocean.

In the telegram of this morning will be found a *verbatim* report of the conversation between Whalen and Doyle and another prisoner, overheard by an inmate of the prison. We give the whole of the conversation with the exception of one or two blasphemous and obscene passages which are unfit for publication. The murder is thus brought home to Whalen.

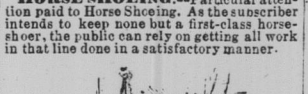
