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estimation of the general public. His word was as good as his bond any time and he was the soul of honor in every transaction. In politics he was a Liberal and could, on more than one occasion, have been the nominee of the party for political honors, had he consented. His good judgement and integrity, caused his services to be eagerly sought after in places of trust and responsibility. In addition to his position as manager of the Southwestern Loan Co., he was also a director of the Southern Loan Co., and Sec. Treas. of the Yarmouth Mutual Fire Insurance Co. He was county police magistrate during the time of the Scott act, and displayed the best of judgement. He leaves a widow and one son, Mr. Wm. J. Leonard, of the Southwestern Loan Co., besides his aged mother and one sister, Mrs. (Dr.) Marlett, both of whom reside in this place. Mr. Leonard was in his 55th year.
