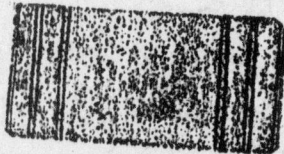

year.

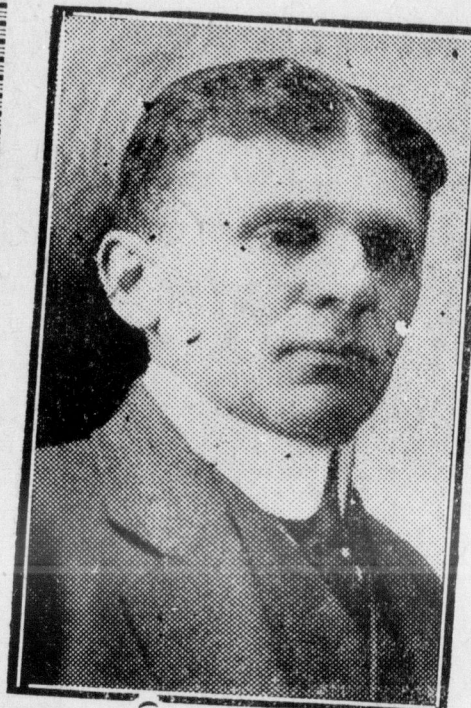
