Toronto, Dec. 28.—11 p.m.—The low mentioned last night is now centered over Manitoba, and pressure is highest over the Middle and Atlantic States. The weather has been for the most part cold and fair from the lakes to the Atlantic, and fair and mild over the western portion of the continent. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 48-50; Calgary, 24-40; Qu'Appelle, 12-38; Winnipeg, 2-30; Port Arthur, 8 below-24; Toronto, 4-24; Ottawa, 10 below-5; Montreal, 2 below-6; Quebec, 2 below-4; Halifax, 8-30.  
Probabilities: Toronto, Dec. 29—1 a.m. Southerly and southwesterly winds, mostly fair and turning mild on Thursday.  
Local Temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory here yesterday were 19.5 above and 8.2 below.

—Hon. Thomas Greenway, premier of Manitoba, arrived here yesterday and left on the afternoon train to visit relatives and friends at Exeter and Centerville.

—Mrs. R. T. Lord, of Newbury, was brought to the city hospital here by her physician, Dr. Carson. An operation for the removal of a tumor was performed, and her friends are hoping for her speedy recovery.  
—Galt Reporter: We regret to learn that Mr. F. S. Hungerford, of the Merchants' Bank staff here, and who was in London to spend Christmas, is ill of typhoid fever in the London hospital. We hope to hear of his speedy recovery.

—Charles Moore, a young man employed by Isaac Brooks, of Westminster, who was arrested a week ago for arson, was committed for trial by Judge J. E. Smyth for setting fire to one of Mr. Nemo's vacant houses on the Bostwick line, Westminster.  
—Mr. Augustus Frieze and Miss Lizette M. Deehan, of this city, were united in marriage in Ingersoll yesterday afternoon by Rev. Father Connolly, of that town. The ceremony was performed in the church, Mr. Patrick Deehan and Miss Teresa G. Deehan, of this city, assisting the groom and bride, respectively.

—Another old resident of London, Mr. Thomas Bradford, passed away Tuesday morning. He was 83 years of age, and a native of Cambridge. He came to Canada nearly 60 years ago, and for nearly 50 years was a resident of London. For many years he was connected with the Dundas Center Methodist Church. The remains will be interred privately tomorrow.

—The Cinematograph and the Gilbert-Gordon Company gave another delightful entertainment in the Auditorium last night. There was a special matinee for ladies and children. The next meeting of the section on Jan. 10 will be devoted to the study of diatoms.

**DEATH OF A PIONEER.**  
The Wife of the Founder of Clinton Town Passed Away at a Ripe Old Age.  
Mrs. Sarah Townsend, relict of the late William Rattenbury, the oldest settler in Huron county, and mother of the late Mrs. George T. Hixson, died at Clinton yesterday morning at the advanced age of 82. The deceased lady was born in Nottinghamshire, England, near the famous Sherwood Forest, of Robin Hood fame, in 1815. She came to Canada with her parents, who settled in "Muddy" York, now Toronto, where, in the year 1835, she was married to the late William Rattenbury, who at that time carried on a blacksmith business there. In the year 1835 she moved with her husband to lot 42, London road, in the township of Tuckersmith, Huron county. Mr. Rattenbury had not been stationed long at his new home when the Mackenzie rebellion broke out, and he was called upon to property under the custody of his wife, he marched under Officers Hyndman and Lizar to the front to aid in the suppression of the rebellion. Mr. Rattenbury was the founder of the flourishing town of Clinton, and will be remembered by the older heads of the county. He had lived in the town of "Bill" Rattenbury, as he was called, purchased the log hotel kept by Thos. Reid, better known as "Yankee Reid," in 1845. The village of Clinton then began to grow, and mainly through his efforts. In the year 1855 the plans of the village were laid. The place was called Clinton in honor and memory of Lieut.-Gen. Clinton, upon whose farm in England Mr. Rattenbury's father was a tenant. For 21 years the home of the deceased lady was at the hotel, which had become famous on account of the popularity and generous disposition of Mr. and Mrs. Rattenbury. The deceased lady had been ailing for months, and was being nursed during her illness last summer by her daughter, Mrs. George T. Hixson, when the latter took ill and died. The surviving members of the family are Joseph and Isaac, Mrs. S. H. Rance, Mrs. F. T. Rance and Mrs. R. H. Reid, all of Clinton. The late Mrs. J. Upshall, of Blythe, were also daughters of the deceased lady. The death of Mrs. Rattenbury's death will be received by all with genuine regret.
