The demand for export cattle here today and at Toronto on Friday last was good, and all the stock suitable for shipment was picked up at 32c to 4c per lb. The receipts of Northwest cattle since May 2 have been about 3,000 head. The ocean treight market continues unsettled, and rates are very irregular, with all kinds of reports in circulation. The demand for freight is, no doubt, limited, and some agents stated that it was doubtful if they would be able to fill their vessels this week, as shippers seem to be holding back some on account of the high prices asked for cattle in the country.
