FIVE PERISHED
IN PRAIRIE FIRE

Mother and Her Four Children Burned to Death.

G. T. B. Conductor Reid Lost His Life at Hamilton.

FIVE VICTIMS OF A PRAIRIE FIRE.

Winnipeg, Oct. 3.—The death of a Galician woman and four children in a prairie fire near Dauphin, on Wednesday, is reported from Portage la Prairie.

CONDUCTOR KILLED.

Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 3.—After over 30 years' faithful service in the employ of the Grand Trunk Railway, Joseph Reid, conductor, was killed yesterday afternoon at the corner of Ferguson avenue and Young street. Reid had charge of a special freight train going to Port Dover, on the Northern Division, and was passing from the engine back to the van when the accident happened. Just as he had crossed the last car, a lumber car, he slipped and fell in reaching for the van. Fred Clarke, Fred Gladwell and Dan Shaw, who were on the train, gave an alarm that stopped the train. It was found that the wheels had not run over Reid, but that the brake-beam had crushed him about the head and body. The accident occurred at 8:30 p.m. Reid was dead when picked up.

FATAL QUARREL.

Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 3.—During a quarrel at a Sunday birthday party Wm. Berle, aged 17, struck Frank Peglau, aged 19, such a heavy blow on the pit of the stomach with his clenched fist, as to cause the latter's death within a few minutes afterwards. BOTH BURNED TO DEATH.

Pierrepont Manor, N. Y., Oct. 3.—Two women, Miss Lucian Clark, aged 45, and her invalid mother, aged 90, were cremated in a fire which destroyed her home Sunday morning. The fire originated in the rear of the house. A Mr. Chaffy, another neighbor, hurried to the scene. Mr. Chaffy burst in a window of Mrs. Clark's room, but was driven back by the smoke. He could see the aged woman waving her hands and when he again cried for help, but was powerless to help her. After the flames were subdued her charred remains and those of her daughter, who was in another room were found.

POUNCE IN SWAMP.

Meerd, Oct. 3.—Mrs. Stoppelben, of Klock's Mills, who stayed away from her father's house in this place, has been found in an exhausted condition after nine days' exposure in a swamp about a mile from the house. She is doing as well as could be expected.

BALLOONIST RESCUED.

Harbor Beach, Mich., Oct. 3.—Prof. William balloonist, while ascending in his balloon at the street fair, dropped into Lake Huron, but was saved from a watery grave by Capt. Ferris and his life-saving crew.

LOST BOTH LEGS.

Toronto, Oct. 3.—John Busby, of Coleman St., P. Q., was struck along the G. T. R. track at Little York on Saturday morning, when he was struck by an engine. Both legs were cut off, one near the ankle and the other above the knee. He was taken to the hospital and is now in a bad way.

MGR. FALCONIO

Arrival of the Apostolic Delegate in Quebec—His Excellency Speaks in English.

Quebec, Oct. 3.—Mgr. Falconio, the apostolic delegate, arrived Sunday afternoon, at 3 o'clock, on board the Dominion Line steamship Vancouver. He was received at the dock by Victor Guillemin, secretary of the archbishop of Quebec, and by the archbishop himself. Mgr. Falconio is a native of Italy, and is now in his 50th year. He is a member of the Pontifical Academy of Sciences, and has been a member of the Pontifical Commission for the Propagation of the Faith since 1901. Archbishop Begin received Mgr. Falconio at the door and conducted him to a side altar, where he donated his robes. Rev. Mr. Arseneault, the secretary of Archbishop Begin, read the pontifical brief appointing Mgr. Falconio apostolic delegate in Canada, and defining the extent of his powers. The document was in Latin, and in reply to inquiries subsequently Mgr. Falconio said that he would decide later whether he would publish a translation of it. The apostolic delegate then addressed the faithful, and the main address, where prayers were offered and his benediction pronounced.

Somewhat unexpectedly, for those present had begun to disperse, the apostolic delegate made a brief address. He thanked the clergy and the people for the fine demonstration. He said that Quebec was widely known from an historical point of view, but it was also well known at Rome for fidelity of its people. He had been commissioned by His Holiness the Pope to pronounce the apostolic benediction, and thought it was an exceedingly fit opportunity to do so. His excellency, to the surprise of those present, who were almost entirely French, used the English language. Afterwards he repaired to the archbishop's palace, where a brief reception was held. Among those who called were Lieut.-Gov. Jetté.

His excellency is a man of average height, dark, with full round face. Though 57 years old, he carries his age very well, and looks like a much younger man. During his brief address at the Basilica, he spoke in English, which he used slowly and with some accent, but perfectly correctly, and those who met him said that he is more familiar with it than with French. He is accompanied by his secretary, Rev. Edward Fisher, a young English priest, who speaks French with fluency. Both his excellency and his secretary belong to the Franciscan Order.

The voyage across was very rough and his excellency felt so fatigued that he begged to be excused from interviews. In fact, he was so much in need of rest that it is improbable that he will go to Montreal on Wednesday for the festival of the patron saint of the order, at which he was expected.

BRUTAL MURDER
IN VICTORIA, B. C.

The Remains of the Woman Were Terribly Mutilated.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 2.—A fiendish murder was committed Friday night on the Indian reserve just beyond the trestle-work on the city side of the engine house of the E. and N. Railway Company. The victim was Mrs. Joan Bings, who, together with her brother, J. Jordan, kept a little bakery on Borne street, nearly opposite the depot of the E. and N. Railway Company. The body was discovered by Officer Walker.

The victim left her little store on Friday night about 8 o'clock, according to the recollection of her brother. She carried a shopping bag and a purse containing the cash receipts of the day. Her husband, who is incapacitated by rheumatism, became alarmed at her failure to reach home, and notified the police.

A search was instituted, but it was nearly 9 o'clock yesterday morning, before the body was discovered at the foot of the railway embankment. The sight was a ghastly one. On her back, her body stripped of every particle of clothing, lay the victim. The most monstrous violence had been employed, the body being terribly mutilated.

Higher up the bank lay the hat and shoes of the deceased, while most of her clothing was beneath the body. Finger-marks upon the throat indicated that the victim had been throttled, and any outcry must have been quickly stifled.

The railway track, alongside which the crime was committed, is much used by the residents of Victoria West, saving a long detour by the road, but Friday night being dark and stormy, any outcry would not have been heard many yards away. There is no clue to the perpetrator of the terrible deed.

Mrs. Bings was a lady of excellent reputation, who over a year ago started the bakery before mentioned, in order to support her family. The latter consists of her crippled husband and a little boy 8 years of age. Deceased came to Victoria from Germany about 15 years ago, and five years later married her husband, then in the employ of the E. and N. Railway Company. They have resided on Borne street at Russell street, Victoria West. The police have as yet no clue to the murderer.

Yesterday afternoon they took into custody a man of sound mind found loitering on the railway bridge near the scene of the crime, and about the same time picked up the dead woman's purse lying near by turned inside out. The suspect paid no attention to the purse, although he saw the constables handle it, and evidently has no connection with the crime.
