Push It Along!

LONDON, June 29.—In the House of Commons today Mr. Gladstone moved the adoption of the resolution providing for the quicker passage of the Home Rule Bill.

T. W. Russell moved the rejection of the resolution.

Mr. Chaplin criticized the Ministers for their refusal to debate the resolution, and eventually moved that as a protest against the conduct of the Ministry an adjournment be taken.

Mr. Chaplin's motion to adjourn was defeated by a vote of 308 to 279.

"Mr. Russell's motion to amend practically so as to reject was defeated by a vote of 308 to 279."

In continuing the debate on the original resolution, Jesse Collins (Liberal-Unionist) moved the Government of intending to evade altogether the discussion of the land question.

Ferdinand de Rothschild (Liberal-Unionist) moved that the House adjourn. Every body was anxious, he said, to follow the Prime Minister's example and go to bed.

These words were greeted with cries of "Shame!" from the Liberals, and the Speaker reproved Mr. de Rothschild.

In urging the Government to assent to an adjournment, Joseph Chamberlain made a cutting remark concerning Mr. Gladstone. Twenty Liberal and Irish members cried "Shame!" and somebody shouted "Judas!"

The Speaker interrupted the discussion to rebuke the unidentified shout.

Mr. Balfour made a final appeal to the Government to accept Rothschild's motion to adjourn.

The House then divided on the motion, which was defeated 283 to 257.

Viscount Cranbourne (Conservative) moved to adjourn.

Sir William Harcourt, Mr. Balfour and others spoke to the motion.

Thomas Sexton, anti-Parliamentary, accused the Opposition of trying to force an all night sitting upon the House and then trying to back out.

On a division the Cranbourne motion to adjourn was lost by a vote of 270 to 242.

At 3:30 o'clock Charles Conyngham (Radical) moved the closure.

The Speaker flatly refused to put the question, and the debate on the original resolution was resumed.

After some further discussion Mr. Balfour agreed to the closure, offering amendments at 7 o'clock to-day, and Sir William Harcourt consented to adjourn the debate. The members rose a few minutes before 4 o'clock.

Novel Incident in the House of Commons.

LONDON, June 30.—John Morley, Chief Secretary for Ireland, and Mr. Balfour, leader of the Opposition, introduced jointly in the House of Commons yesterday a bill enabling the Government to acquire land in Ireland to acquire land to be occupied by migrating tenants.

This is the first instance in modern Parliamentary history of the Government's introducing a bill supported by the leader of the Opposition.

It is calculated on the Government side of the House that the session will be adjourned in the first week of September, and that the autumn session will be called to begin about the last of October.

The Queen's Statue Unveiled.

LONDON, June 29.—The statue of the Queen, the work of Princess Beatrice, her Majesty's youngest daughter, was unveiled yesterday in Kensington gardens. The statue was beautiful. The noble representation of the Queen was well represented. The statue was unveiled by the Queen in person. The work has been highly commended for its artistic merit.

The Duke of York was not present at the unveiling. He is not in the best of health, and is under medical treatment.

The Financial Flurry

New York Gets Over an Exciting Day.

The Crucial Test Believed to Have Been Passed.

Money Rapidly Drops From 50 to 15—Unabated Interest Manifested in the Silver Question—Many Mines Closing Down.

The Bilton's Show.

LONDON, June 29.—The announcement contained in the cable reaches from Europe to the effect that the will of the late Earl of Bilton had been reversed by the courts in favor of the test son, the husband of Belle Bilton, a music hall fame, is wrong, and the present Countess of Bilton is further off from the question of a title and estates than she has been before.

When the late lord died he bequeathed all his residuary estate, both real and personal, to his "well-known" daughter, who will religiously carry out what she knows to be his wish in the disposal thereof.

These words, master of the rolls declared to constitute a trust; but as it was not sufficiently defined he decided that the daughter could not hold the real estate in trust for her, the present earl, with whom she is now speaking terms in consequence of his ill-health.

The Lord Chief Justice of Ireland, the Lord Chief Justice of the other members of the Supreme Court of Appeal of the Emerald Isle have now made a final decision, reversing the judgment of the master of the rolls and proclaiming the daughter countess absolute owner of the landed estates, as well as of the personal property, with free and untrammelled powers of disposal.

As the one object of the old earl in making his will was to prevent his daughter-in-law from ever obtaining the slightest control over either of his estates or fortune, it is evident that the present Countess of Bilton will stand but little chance of deriving any benefit under the will of her father-in-law.

The Home Rule Bill.

LONDON, June 30.—More than 1,000 amendments to the Home Rule Bill, only 350 so far have been disposed of, and the Opposition appear determined to insist in pressing their amendments until their wings are clipped by strong measure of closure. When the committee stage ends a month hence, under the present arrangement, the bill will have been in committee for more than a year in the history of Parliament.

The Franco-Newfoundland Treaty.

LONDON, June 30.—The House of Lords yesterday, Lord Russell (Conservative) asked what Government had done to secure the execution of the treaty obligations with France regarding Newfoundland. He also desired information as to whether arbitration questions at issue would proceed, and move vivendi between France and Great Britain be renewed.

The Marquis of Ripon, Secretary of State for the Colonies, declined to make any pledge as to the Government's future action. France, he said, was willing to accept the arbitration of the arbitration tribunal which had expired this year. Much must be said on the action of the Government Newfoundland.

A WOMAN THE VICTIM.

Horrible Murder Perpetrated in a San Francisco Saloon—The Victim a "Drunk."

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—One of the most atrocious murders ever committed in this city occurred at an early hour on Wednesday morning, but the details did not become known until last night, and are too revolting to add of being described. The victim, Kate Griggs, widow of a late reported one of the local papers, and her mother were Martin O'Neil, foreman of the vanishing department of the Union Iron works. The woman was found in a dying condition in a room of a saloon on a harbor front, and died while being removed to the hospital.

An autopsy revealed the fact that the woman had been horribly murdered and died from internal hemorrhage.

Mrs. Griggs was a young woman, very attractive appearance, but recently had become addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors and had been in the habit of visiting the saloon in which she met her death. While coming to San Francisco from the ferry boat on Tuesday evening, she met O'Neil with whom she had a long acquaintance. He is 50 years of age, has a family and has been regarded as a respectable man. He invited Mrs. Griggs to the saloon and they remained there until several hours, during which they drank a great deal and became much intoxicated, especially the man.

It is not known how the crime occurred. The woman made no outcry, and, per O'Neil had completed the horrible murder, she left the saloon and Mrs. Griggs not discovered until the bartender of occasion to enter the room. O'Neil was a drunken stupor when arrested and else remembers nothing of the tragedy.

ELOPED FROM SCHOOL.

Another River Fatality.

Police Sergeant McGuire's Son Drowned in the Thames.

At Blackfriars Dam—He Could Not Swim.

Another drowning accident occurred in the Thames at noon to-day by which Willie, the 14-year-old son of Police Sergeant McGuire, lost his life. The dead boy and a companion named Sandy McKenna had gone to bathing at Blackfriarsdam. Neither of the lads could swim, and in a short time young McGuire got beyond his depth and began to sink. He rose to the surface two or three times and made considerable outcry, but his companion was powerless to assist him. After the drowning boy had sunk for the last time, young McKenna dressed himself and went up to the mill where he had some of the lads. The patrol wagon and a doctor were telephoned for, and the work of recovery commenced. It was fully half an hour before Henry Clarke, an employee of the mill, by diving found the body in one of the numerous holes abounding in that part of the river. The body was recovered in the patrol. The work of recovering the lad's parents was then undertaken by a brother officer, Sgt. McGuire, on night duty this week, or he would probably have been with the patrol that drove down in time to see his son's remains taken from the water.

This portion of the Thames, with its many holes has been the cause of more drowning accidents than any other part of the river.

The victim was a bright, amiable boy, and the worthy sergeant will have the deepest sympathy. An inquest will hardly be necessary.

Late Canadian News

A Roman Catholic Welcome to the Christian Endeavor Convention in Montreal.

MONTREAL, June 30.—People from the United States and Canada who propose attending the great Christian Endeavor convention will be gratified to know that the Roman Catholic population of Montreal will do everything in their power to make the visitors comfortable both in mind and body as their Protestant brethren. The True Witness, the organ of the English-speaking Catholics here, cordially welcomes the strangers to what it calls the most important of the continent. "In a few days," says the True Witness, "men and women in thousands will fill our streets, and they will represent the intellect, the spirit, the refinement and the strength of Protestantism. They come as the representatives of diverse sects and varied creeds, all Christian, but each differing from the others in some particular, and they come to make joint efforts in the cause of union, harmony and truth. They seek the union of denominations, they desire to see harmony reign in the religious world, and they wish to find the truth that they may proclaim it to the universe. We must learn from them," says the paper, "to be in courage, perseverance, zeal and fidelity to the object of life from the members of that convention. In them we expect to see exemplified, not fanaticism nor bigotry, but honest, well-meaning, untiring devotion to a cause that they hold sacred, and in their example we should learn to be as fervent in the cause that we know to be that of union, harmony and truth all combined. Our second duty, or part, is to teach them by our example what really a Catholic city is, and what the Catholic home has always been. By simply keeping the even tenor of our daily lives, hundreds of these visitors will go away impressed with what they have never before understood." This admirable article concludes as follows: "For this is our duty when ever it may fall to our lot to meet and greet the delegates in a truly Christian spirit, to extend to them every courtesy that is within our power, and to pray that success may crown their mission."

France Wants to Come Back.

CHICAGO, June 30.—France wants to come back into the fold and have her exhibits complete for the exposition prizes. Among other things which the French commissioner has asked the commissioner on awards is that the naming of a certain number of judges shall be accorded to the French commissioners and that a graded system of prizes shall be offered. The commission on awards has agreed that France shall have as much to say as any other foreign country in the appointment of judges, but is not willing to consent to the second part of the French proviso, but it is said to say the French exhibits in all departments will be re-entered in competition.

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Telegraphic Brevities

There is much excitement throughout Chili among mine owners and dealers in silver, on account of the fall in the price of silver. It is likely all the silver mines will be closed down except the celebrated Huanchaca mine.

A Mexico dispatch says: Secretary of the Treasury Lamantour says there is no truth in the rumor that Mexico contemplates suspending the free coinage of silver. On the contrary all of the Mexican mints will be worked to the utmost.

Hanged in Effigy.

Citizens of Naperville, Ill., Indignant Over Gov. Altgeld's Action.

CHICAGO, June 30.—Gov. John P. Altgeld's action in pardoning the Anarchists has roused the residents of the town of Naperville, near this city, to such a pitch that they gave expression to their feelings last night by hanging the governor in effigy. A large statue figure surmounted by a counterfeit presentation of the governor's head and face was swung across the principle street of the town. Hanging from the neck across the breast were painted two hands clasped in a grasp of friendship. On one hand was the word "Anarchy," on the other "Altgeld." The effigy hanging in the moonlight attracted a large crowd of people, many of whom gave free expression of their approval. There was considerable excitement and it was not until this morning that the effigy was cut down by the authorities.

A Canadian Forger Captured in Salem, Mass.

BOSTON, Mass., June 29.—Elias Mailoux, a Canadian, charged with forgery, and formerly accountant of the Public Works department for the Province of Quebec, was arrested on Wednesday in Salem, Mass. The forgeries were perpetrated under the Provincial Government in June, 1892, since which time Mailoux has avoided arrest. He admits being the man wanted for the \$9,700 check cashed by the Union Bank of Quebec, but denies being the writer of the forged signature.

A couple of society young men were found on the streets at an early hour the other morning in company with a young woman—Ella Wilson, a stranger. P. C. Howie arrested the latter for vagrancy. The young men, through their lawyer, furnished \$100 bail and secured the girl's release. When the case was called this morning at the Police Court Ella was not there. The bird had flown. As a result the young men will have to pay \$100 to the court if she does not appear Tuesday. This is very unlikely, as she has gone to Detroit. The men will be summoned for alleged disorderly conduct, but as present are visiting friends outside the city.

George Leonard, a laborer advanced in years, was accused by his wife, Emilia, with assault. He pleaded guilty. Mrs. Leonard stated that her husband had abused her severely, that he had savagely thrown his young son to the ground, and that in fits of anger he had maltreated her prior to the circumstances in question. "If you forgive me this time," pleaded the old man, tearfully, "I will never repeat the offense." "I cannot," said his wife, firmly. "I have stood your outrageous conduct long enough." The magistrate adjourned the case until Tuesday.

"I was only in the town an hour and a half," he said, "and during that time I did not beg or borrow or steal anything." "Were you ever in jail before?" asked the magistrate.
