CABLE NOTES.
Filipino rebels, 250 strong, were routed in a fight with 63 Americans near Bataan, Luzon.
Mr. Hay denies having presented the draft of a new Nicaraguan canal treaty to Pancoff.
Germany's plea to tax department stores is said to be resulting in the closing of many establishments.

Business failures and a generally panicky feeling are reported regarding Japan as a result of recent bank failures.
Cologne's two captives have descended from the clouds in a balloon which ran away with them yesterday and will hereafter travel afoot.
Disorders in Barcelona continue. The Spanish authorities declare they have rarely seen a mob so violent as that of the last two days. The Madrid press calls on the government to vigorously suppress the Catalan movement.

The ambassadors of the foreign powers have dispatched identical notes to the porte characterizing the seizures by the Ottoman postal authorities of foreign mail bags as a breach of international law, and holding the porte responsible for the consequences.
The Canadian Gazette (London, England) argues that if the prices current for stock in the American market are justifiable, then the Canadian Pacific must be well worth the present figure, when the company has this year demonstrated its power to endure a bad harvest without any diminution in its receipts.

NEW PARLIAMENT OF AUSTRALIA

Inaugural Address of the Duke of Cornwall and York.

Melbourne, May 9.—The Duke of Cornwall and York, in his address at the opening of the Australian Federal Parliament today, referred to the wishes of the late Queen who, before her death, signed his commission to open parliament. He paid a tribute to the generous aid rendered by the colonies in the South African war, the splendid bravery of the troops and the services of the squadron in China, and expressed the interest taken by King Edward VII. in the Australian people. It was his earnest prayer that the union so happily achieved, would prove an instrument for the further advancing of the welfare of the Australian subjects of the King and the consolidation of the empire. Then the Duke read the following telegram from King Edward:
"My thoughts are with you upon this august occasion. I wish the Commonwealth of Australia every happiness and prosperity."

THIRTEEN NEW PHYSICIANS

Annual Convocation of the Western Medical College.

INTERESTING CEREMONY OF CONFERRING THE DEGREE OF M. D. ON THE GRADUATING CLASS OF 1901.

The annual convocation of the medical department of the Western University brought together a great gathering of the students and their friends at the Auditorium last evening. The graduating class consisted of the following thirteen gentlemen:
J. W. Atkinson, Avon (gold medalist); Alf. Grant, city (honors); W. C. Doyle, Merlin; J. Smith, Buffalo (honors); Alex. Turner, Dutton; W. C. Fawcett, city; W. Clark, city; Clifford Reason, city; J. Rogers, Belmont; G. Elliott, Port Stanley; F. Meek, Port Stanley; J. Craig, city; J. Russell, city.

The platform was very prettily decorated for the occasion with palms and flowers. On the dais, flanking the speaker, were the Very Rev. Dean Innes, who, in the absence of the Bishop of Huron, presided; the Moorhouse, dean of the medical faculty; Rev. Dr. Smith, Rev. Dr. Soverby, Dr. Waugh, Dr. Balfour, Dr. Hodge, Mr. John Dearness, assistant principal of Normal School, and Prof. James, of the Western University.
Dean Innes, in his opening address, spoke of the excellent work being done by the Western Medical School, and predicted that it would grow stronger and more influential as the years passed by. He complimented the students on their excellent standing, and took occasion to congratulate them upon having had the benefit of such painstaking and capable instructors.

The valedictory was read by Mr. W. C. Doyle, of Merlin. The address, which was unusually well written, contained a reference to the untiring efforts of the faculty in the students' behalf, and expressed the hope that a stronger bond of union might be raised up between the junior and senior years.
Dr. Balfour, superintendent of Victoria Hospital, and himself an old Western College boy, delivered an interesting address, after which the degrees were conferred by Dean Innes, assisted by Dr. Moorhouse and Dr. Hodge. Prof. James presented the certificates, and Mr. Atkinson received the gold medal at the hands of Dean Innes. Certificates of honor were presented to Messrs. Grant and Smith.
Rev. Dr. Soverby, pastor of the Talbot Street Baptist Church, closed the convocation exercises with a brief but interesting address, in which he referred to both the dignity and the dangers of the profession.
During the evening excellent music was rendered by Mr. P. L. Evans' orchestra. Songs were also given by Mr. H. R. McDonald.

TERRIBLE DEATH

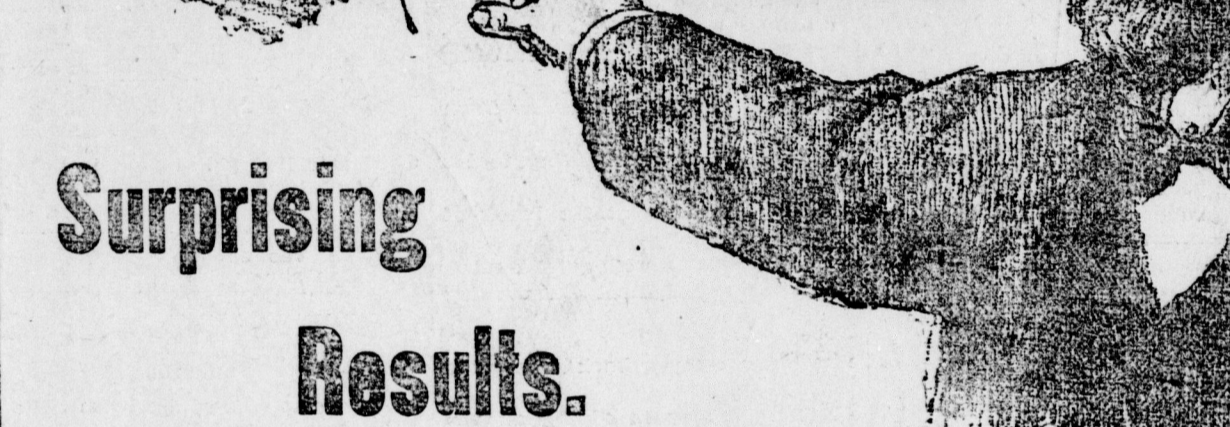
