Balfour Talks About Irish and South African Questions-Missionaries Eaten by Savages.

London, May 9. - The board of trade returns for the four months ending April 3 show the following increases in British imports from Canada Sheep and lambs, £10,000; oats, £20,000; per pound and take our pay in beets, peas, £44,000; maize, £53,000; cheese, or for cash if desired. Letters will go £202,000; wood pulp, £50.000: hewn wood, £4,000; sawn, £82,000. Decrease - Cattle, £34,000; wheat, £233,000; wheat flour, £38,000; bacon, £50,000; hams, £48,000; fish, £6,000; animals,

> The chief increases in British exports to Canada are: Spirits, £14,000; worsted, tissues, £12,000; earthenware, £12,000; British East Indian tea, £11, 000. Decreases-Wool, £10,000; £18,000; linen, £16,000; carpets, £15,000; pig iron, £9,000; tin plates, £43,000; cast and wrought iron, £10,000; unwrought steel, £73,000; apparel and cloths, £9,000; haberdashery, £13,000.

rose League. Mr. Balfour traversed wide field in his discussion of the Irish and South African questions.
"Although little was heard of home rule at the last election," said Mr. Balfour, "the Nationalists have now started a new method, intended to the country into granting home rule. Every animal, from man down-wards, used the weapons Providence put at its disposal, and there might he some Nationalists in the House of Commons endowed by nature with the aptitudes necessary to make the best use of the new methods of warfare.

Referring to the South African war, Mr. Balfour declared the hardest pro-Boer prophets must now be convinced that the resolution of the British people was unalterable, and that the de-termination of the people had found a most conclusive and admirable ex pression in the bye-election at Monmouth, the very heart of the coal district, which erroneously supposed itself to have been singled out for harsh financial treatment on account of the burdens of the war.

MISSIONARIES' FEARFUL FATE. A search party, which has returned from New Guinea, discovered the halfeaten remains of Rev. James Chalmers and Rev. Oliver Tomkins, of the Lon-don Missionary Society, and their followers, who were massacred in April by natives of Fly River, New Guinea, after a tribal fight. Inaugural Address of the Duke of Cornwall

and York.

Melbourne, May 9 .- The Duke of Cornwall and York, in his address at the opening of the Australian Federal Parliament today, referred to the wishes of the late Queen who, before er death, signed his commission to pen parliament. He paid a tribute o the generous aid rendered by the colonies in the South African war, the splendid bravery of the troops and the services of the squadron in China, and expressed the interest taken by King Edward VII. in the Australian people. It was his earnest prayer that the union, so hapiply achieved, would prove an instrument for the further advancing of the welfare of the Australian subjects of the King and the consolidation of the empire. Then the Duke read the following telegram from "My thoughts are with you upon this august occasion. I wish the Commonwealth of Australia every happi-
