Simla, India, July 9.—Dread of another mutiny is being felt by all Europeans here. India is in a very serious state, and the authorities are making heroic endeavors to prevent the unrest and the mutinous spirit, which, in spite of all their efforts, is spreading like an infection from province to province.

The cause of this condition is the war between Russia and Japan for the supremacy of the yellow race, which has come as a revelation to the natives. That an Asiatic race has defied and even conquered a European race has made them think. The spirit of dissatisfaction and trouble in the air now is far more acute than it was two years before the acute than it was two years before the

What makes the situation more dangerous is the ability of the "Baboos" to spread the tidings of revolt to every end of the Indian Empire with rapidity and ease. The problem of how news traveled to the utmost ends of India in the days of the mutiny has only been partly solved. Since then Lord Ripon has dignified Indian native opinion, and the "Baboo" can make himself as easily heard as his master.
