

SERVED WRIT ON PHILLIPS' LAWYER

To Prevent York Loan Man
Selling Toronto Life Stock.

MORE AGENTS AS WITNESSES

Give Some Interesting Evidence as
to Payments—Insurance as
a Side Line.

Toronto, April 10.—The Joseph Phillips case was resumed in the police court this afternoon. At the outset, Mr. Jones protested against the way the case was being conducted, as he was losing valuable time.

An attempt was made to serve a writ on Phillips, but the server was told to serve it on Mr. Jones, as no writ could be served on Phillips while he was in the dock.

The writ is from the National Trust Company, and asks all holders of Toronto Life stock not to transfer their stock.

Mr. G. E. Stacey was the first witness called, and in answer to Mr. Curry said he had been agent of the York County Loan, and sold terminating shares. He was paid on commission while he was an agent. In connection with the National Monthly the agents were told that they need not devote all their time to the York Loan, and that they could work on the magazine on commission. The general impression was that the magazine was the property of the York Loan, but he himself believed it belonged to Phillips.

"And were the agents paid a bonus on the sale of four magazines, just as they were on four shares of stock?" "The agents under superintendents were not in my province. I looked after the collectors," was the reply.

After considerable badgering the witness said that he knew that agents were not paid bonuses for sale of magazines.

"I can produce a superintendent who will say that he took the money and allowed the agents their bonuses on magazines as well as shares," said Mr. Curry.

"I don't know about that." "I can, I think, convince you, too, that the National Monthly was the property of the York Loan, floated with its own money," said Mr. Curry. Continuing, the crown attorney said:

RAILWAY MEASURES

The Legislature Committee Pass on Several Important Bills.

Toronto, April 10.—In view of the opposition expressed to the giving of full powers to a short local line, Mr. George Lynch Staunton, in the railway committee of the Legislature this morning, withdrew the Hamilton Terminal Railway Company's bill and announced that application would be made to the Dominion Government for legislation.

The bill to incorporate the Port Elgin spur line railway was allowed to stand over. Sanction was given to two bills dealing with roads radiating from the city of Hamilton.

That to incorporate the Hamilton and Guelph Junction Railway met with no opposition.

This company is empowered to construct a road from Hamilton to meet the Ontario and Quebec Railway at Guelph Junction.

The Hamilton, Caledonia and Lake Erie Railway's charter received a new lease of life.

Another two years was allowed for the construction of the line between Hamilton and Caledonia.

The Northern Midland Railway Company received an extension of the road must be commenced within two and ready for operation within four years.

HOLDS UP BODY

Undertaker Will Not Forward It Until Money Arrives.

Toronto, April 10.—On Sunday last Mrs. John Turner, of this city, heard by telegram from La Junta, Col., of the death of her son, Jack Turner. He was a switchman and was killed by a train.

Today the mother received a letter written by the young man just before he went out to meet death on the tracks. The letter spoke cheerfully of the prospect of the son's approaching return to his home, and was couched in most affectionate terms. He had been away three years.

John Turner, the young man's father, telegraphed to have the body sent to Toronto, and received in reply a telegram from La Junta, undertaker who demanded \$210 before he could release the remains.

The telegram hinted that the \$210 could be paid out of the life insurance, which amounted to \$1,000.

The Turners appealed to the city reliever officer today for advice. They will raise the money on the policy and send it.

Traveler Greenville Dead.

Kingsville, April 10.—George A. Greenville, a prominent traveler, is dead at the public general hospital in Chatham, where he went some time ago for treatment. Mr. Greenville was a well-known and popular resident of this town for a number of years, and had a host of friends who will greatly regret his death.

Mr. Greenville was attacked by pernicious anaemia some time ago, and in spite of treatment, grew constantly worse, until he came in Chatham yesterday.

He was aged 60 years and 6 months, and will be buried here.

Liquidation Dangerous.

London, April 10.—At the annual meeting of the Manitoba Mortgage Investment Company a dividend of one shilling per share was recommended, and that sum was ordered to be carried forward, which will amount to about 5d per share.

The chairman said with regard to a realization on their property they had had various offers, but none of them came to anything, and if they declared that they were going into liquidation there would be danger of their losing the opportunities of sales. He believed they could continue their present course with safety, but that the moment they went into liquidation it would be highly dangerous. It was not likely that the shareholders would get more than 2s a share on realization.

After a brief discussion the report was adopted unanimously.

Death of Samuel Randall.

Dutton, April 10.—Word has been received here from Buffalo, N. Y., of the death of Mr. Samuel Randall, of that city. Deceased had been ill for over a year with paralysis and his death was not entirely unexpected.

He was born in the township of Southwold in 1846, and resided near St. Thomas for a number of years. He was also well known in Dunwich.

About six years ago he removed to Buffalo, where he was employed as a contractor in street railway construction.

He leaves a family of two sons and one daughter, Miss Catherine Randall. Leavington, Frederick, Buffalo, N. Y.; John, Dutton. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. John Kendall, Dutton. The funeral will take place at Learnington on Wednesday afternoon.
