Excites Considerable Interest In

Washington—Monroe Doctrine Involved.

Washington, July 31.—Considerable curiosity exists in Washington as to whether the Dutch Government in dispatching the cruiser Gelderland to Venezuela contemplates any further step than merely "the protection of Dutch interests in that country."

This is rather an elastic term and may be called on to cover wide latitude of action. It is possible that the Netherlands Government, in view of the anti-Venezuelan demonstrations in Willemstad on Saturday and Sunday, thinks it best to have available a warship in case of emergency. Curacao is the nearest Dutch port, and has suffered financial loss as a result of various orders of President Castro since the prevalence of the bubonic plague, but it is not believed here the Dutch Government expects to take any retaliatory steps on Venezuelan territory to redress such grievances. Whatever the plan may be, Holland has not communicated her intentions to this Government and nothing indicative of her course is known officially in Washington.

It is pointed out here that if Holland contemplates taking measures against Venezuela there are several European countries, as well as America, whose wishes should first be consulted. Venezuela has been for some time paying monthly installments on her foreign debt, the result of an arbitration arranged several years ago by American Minister Bowen, when the allied powers of Europe blockaded the principal ports of Venezuela, and threatened to take more forceful measures because of President Castro's refusal to meet his obligations.

Monroe Doctrine Involved.

In official circles attention also is called to the misapprehension which appears to prevail in regard to the Monroe doctrine in the discussion of the relations of European governments towards the countries south of us. As stated by President Roosevelt in his first message to congress that doctrine is a declaration that there must be no territorial aggrandizement by any non-American power at the expense of any American power on American soil. It is now intended as hostile

to any nation in the old world, said the President. Particular reference is made to the following paragraph from the President's message, which has a bearing in the present instance: "This doctrine has nothing to do with the commercial relations of any American power, save that it is in truth always each of them to form such as it desires. In other words, it is really a guarantee of the commercial independence of the Americas. We do not ask under this doctrine for any exclusive commercial dealings with any other American state. We do not guarantee any state against punishment if it misuses its power in the Americas. This is a doctrine which is not to be taken the form of the acquisition of territory by any non-American power."

Today's dispatches to the state department from Consul Cheney at Willemstad, confirm the press reports in the riotous demonstration in the city on Saturday and Sunday which had an outcome in the departure of the Venezuelan consul and the newspaper correspondent, Granchio, both of whom left for Venezuela on the steamer Maracaibo. The dispatch (Mr. Cheney's) said that the residence of the consul was surrounded Saturday night by a mob which demanded an apology for the attack in policy, threatening vengeance. This presumably refers to the attitude which President Castro has maintained in dealing with the Curacao merchants.

Venezuela's Position.

The departure of the consul and the newspaper correspondent will, it is thought at the state department, remove the immediate cause of the trouble, leaving the more serious question to be settled in a calmer way. Venezuela has made it clear to the Netherlands Government that in expelling Minister de Reus recently she took steps which affected that person only and that it would not alter the existing friendly relations between Venezuela and the Netherlands.

Whether the "friendly relations" can continue in view of more recent events is a question that is causing some comment.
