The duty collected amounted to fourteen and a quarter millions, a decrease of a little over six millions compared with the first four months of last year. During July alone the Miss Elizabeth May Stewart Becomes husband, he yelled, 'Let me go! I'll finish imports amounted to \$22,967,094, or a decrease of \$11,590,904, and there was a falling off of \$1,914,257 in the customs revenue for the month.

Canada's exports for the four months ending with July totalled \$67 .-205,010, a decrease of \$5,485,364, compared with the same period the year Miss Elizabeth May Stewart became before. The exports of the products of the mines fell off about a half million dollars in value, while exports of fish increased by about the same amount. There was a decline of a million and a quarter in the export of lumber. Half a million dollars' worth of animals and their produce were exported. In agricultural exports there was a decline of four and threequarter millions. Manufacturers increased their exports by three hundred and fifty thousand dollars. During the month of July only the exports totalled \$23,116,234, which is four and a half millions less than during the same month of last year.
