Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 7 .- Shortly after Colonel Roosevelt arrived here today he found himself involved in a controversy with Emil Seidel, the Socialistic maoyr, who had declined to act upon the reception committee which welcomed the colonel to Milwaukee.

In a contribution to The Big Stick, a newspaper published by the Milwaukee Press Club, for this occasion, Mayor Seidel stated that "if Mr. Roosevelt comes to Milwaukee holding the same ideas which he expressed in an article published by him March 20, 1909, it is clear that he cannot serve the cause of honesty and decency in American political life.
