his country to a great accomplishment,
and by the same token, a manufac-
turer, he cannot sight the shadow of
intrusion upon his trade interests.

Rather he thinks of an appeal made
to his father, the giant of all farmers
in Lambton County, from Chicago
firms for hay by the carload at ad-
vanced prices, with the hope ex-
pressed that with the coming of reciprocity
the drawing upon the market of
Lambton and Ontario might be ma-
terially extended. Those are the sort
of arguments that Dr. Fairbank is
strictly non-political, and numbers
with Dr. Fairbank, among its officers
A. M. J. Hanna and R. J. McCormick, M. P.

Perhaps it is that the candidate's
delving into science research for many
years gives him his ready grasp of
statistics. He can produce deductions
in verification of everything upon
which he presents an argument, and
yet his contact with practical business
has made him anything but a theo-
ret.

American Benefits Familiar.

Lambton has an advantage over
many of the other ridings in that it
practically has a given trial. The
returns from the port of Sarnia will
prove this. Thousands of tons of hay,
thousands of gallons of cream, and
sugar beets to the value of more than
\$100,000 have gone through the tun-
nel in the fiscal year ending March,
1911, and, thanks to Mr. Armstrong's
enterprise, the present year is said to
have brought an increase.

Dr. Fairbank largely submerges
himself to the issue in this campaign.
He dwells little on the service of
himself and his father to the riding
nor does he recall Mr. Armstrong's
bitter fight with his own party on en-
tering the field. He sends home cream
and sugar and fruit, and the farmers
respond. He is not drawing attention
to the work of the Lambton Publicity
Association, because that body is
strictly non-political, and numbers
with Dr. Fairbank, among its officers
A. M. J. Hanna and R. J. McCormick, M. P.

Those who have studied all the ad-

been in Petrolia for forty-six years.
Though he has the degree M.D., he
has given attention to business inter-
ests, being president of the Petrolia
Wagon Works, and associated with
other institutions. He is Lambton
County member of the senate of the
Western University, and remembers
the city of London as the place where
he spent four of his happiest years
as a student at Hellmuth College.

Dr. Fairbank launches into his
round of meetings within a few days,
and, with the men of both parties un-
der his platform, he expects to present
a splendid gain to the Liberal party.

REV. GUINNESS ROGERS DEAD.

London, Aug. 21. — The Rev. Guin-
ness Rogers, formerly minister of Chap-
man's Church, and well-known as an
author of religious books, died here
today. He was born on Dec.
28, 1822.

CHANGE OF AIR WOULD HELP POPE

But This Would Mean Moving Out of the Vatican.

Rome, Aug. 21.—The Pope is out of
danger, and convalescence, but will he
ever be really well again? Will he
ever become as strong again as he was
before he threw away his return
ticket to Venice and shut himself up
in the Vatican?

That is the question of absorbing in-
terest here. Professor Macchiavelli
and Dr. Petacci, the two celebrated
physicians who for months have un-
singly and assiduously attended the
Pontiff and studied his profound
condition, answer that notwithstanding
his 77 years, his rundown state,
his overworked, strenuous life, he
could recover entirely on certain es-
sential conditions, chief among which
would be a change of air.

This would mean moving out of the
Vatican, thus renouncing one of the
forms of protest which the Holy See
adopted at the fall of the temporal
power in order to maintain its claims
for the civil possession of Rome.

There is a strong party which de-
clares that so precious a life as that
of Pius X. must not be risked as a
sacrifice to what is really a simple

form, as the essence of the protest is
not represented by voluntary and to
a certain extent, useless imprison-
ment in the Vatican, but has been
solely contained in every word, in
every document, in all official docu-
ments which for the last 41 years have
emanated from the three men who
have sat in the chair of St. Peter since
Sept. 20, 1878.
