


## CONTAINS ALL THE NEWS THAT IS NEWS

FRANK MORAN LEARNED BOXING AT COLLEGE.  
BUT HE ACQUIRED HIS PUNCH IN THE RING.

This month Frank Moran, free, white, 26, and possessed of a punch, is to attempt to wrest the heavyweight championship crown from Jack Johnson.

The negro will enter the ring probably better than a 2-to-1 chance, the odds being based entirely upon Johnson's past ability as compared with Moran's. Experience, record, weight, reach and almost everything, save youth, favor the negro. Perhaps nine out of ten students of the boxing game, in America as well as in France, believe that Moran will be easy for the negro champion.

Oddly enough, I find that the more deeply studious English critics are not so confident as to the outcome; and, remember, they have seen Moran in the ring more often than the critics of America have. Then, among some of the most astute insiders in the United States there is a feeling that Moran is being underrated.

Who is this Frank Moran? He scarcely is known in the United States and, for a championship aspirant, has had few battles. Frank Moran is one of the most intelligent fighters the game ever has seen and is perhaps the best educated of any of the modern battlers.

Moran went to college, and not for the athletic part of it. He learned boxing while in school. His line, however, was football. He played with his college team. He was a whale at football, a plunging tackle, and after he left college he joined the famous Lyceum professional football team.

Oddly enough, Moran was not boasting nor press-agitating himself. The big blond giant evidently had an idea that Johnson would give him a chance more quickly if he came without much of a reputation than if he came with a lot of it. He astonished the boxing world by getting the match with John-

son. Now he says, very quietly, that the world has another surprise coming late this month.

The National league ought to get better team work. Here the Chicago management is claiming the team is drawing as well as ever, and then Barney Dreyfuss goes home and tells what his share of the receipts were.

FEDERAL SHOLD WHIP  
HAND, SAYS GILMORE

Declares They Could Wreck  
Other Big Leagues in  
Thirty Days.

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, June 17.—The Federal League can wreck, from a playing standpoint, the two big leagues within thirty days if it cares to sign all the players who have asked to be taken over, according to a statement here today by James A. Gilmore, president of the Federals. Gilmore repeated his statement that forty players are ready to leave the National and American Leagues, but he would not say how many of them would be absorbed at this time.

The Chicago American League team, which so far has escaped the Federal raids almost intact, according to reports will lose other players beside Chase, who will play his last game in a White Sox uniform a week from tomorrow. Scott, Russell, Weaver, Benz and Blackburn are players the White Sox will lose, according to the report.

Up until yesterday Bobby Heck had won 8 games and lost 1, while Shocker's record was a shade better, he having 9 wins and 1 defeat. It is a peculiar coincidence that both twirlers should lose their second game on the same day. Timely hitting with men on bases was responsible for the defeats in both cases.










Shocker is a right-handed, curve-ball pitcher. He has a world of speed and a sharp-breaking hook that will win him a lot of games. He lacked control yesterday, and most of the Saints' hits were made when his curve-ball did not break as he intended it to. When he has control, Shocker will be just as hard a man as Heck to beat.

Bobby Heck's defeat is surprising in view of the way in which he pitched against Erie in London on Saturday. On that day he made the Yankees look foolish in their effort to hit him, and they only managed to get two safe blows. Yesterday he was performing before big league scouts and he was slammed pretty hard. It is always the way in baseball, and it only goes to prove that the best of them have trouble getting by some times. Even Walter Johnson is losing games these days.

MIKE MULLIN HAS NOT MADE  
AN ERROR IN SEVENTEEN GAMES

London Third Sacker Sets New Canadian League Record by Accepting 55 Chances Without a Slip-Up—Has Made Twenty Hits in That Time Also.

One of the most gratifying things in connection with the playing of the London club in its recent games is the manner in which Mike Mullin has rounded into form. As a hitter and fielder there is not a third baseman in the league that has been going as good as Mullin has in the last dozen or so games. For the past seventeen games Mike has accepted fifty-five chances without making one error and this is thought to be a Canadian League record.

Has Great Batting Eye.

At the bat Mike has been doing more than his share. In the past seventeen contests that he has participated in he has made 20 hits, averaging more than one hit per game. If the records of other third basemen in the Canadian League could be gone over it is doubtful if a performance equalling Mullin's could be found.

One of the peculiar things about it all is that a few weeks ago Mullin was slated for his release. His showing in the early part of the season was such

as to make "Doc" Reisinger hunt for another third-sacker. When the team concluded its long stretch of games at Tecumseh park a few weeks ago, Manager Reisinger decided that unless Mike showed considerable improvement in his playing he would let him out.

Mullin was given another week's trial, and since that time he has made good with a vengeance. The last error that Mike made was on May 25, when London played a double header here with the Toronto Beavers. In the second game Mike had two boots but since then his fielding has been perfect.

Started it in Ottawa.

Mullin's improvement dates back to the opening game in Ottawa on Sunday, May 31. He started clouting the ball for extra-base drives on that day, and has not suffered much of a relapse since. He has gone hitless in a couple of games, but has always come back the next day with a bunch of wallops. His batting average has been steadily climbing until he is now in the select .300 class, and indications are that he will stay there. He is also leading the other third basemen in the league in fielding.

The Modern Shoe Repair defeated the Canadian Shoe Repair last evening in an interesting game of ball by the score of 16-9.


