All Factions in Mexico May Be Brought Together, Following Resignation of Huerta's Successor.

[Canadian Press.]

Washington, July 17 .- Administration officials saw peace today on the horizon of Mexican politics. Francisco Carbajal's informal statement to the Washington Government that he intended to retire in favor of Carranza, Constitutionalist chief, and Carranza's announcement that he was willing to negotiate with the Federals for peaceful transfer of power in Mexico City, was regarded as practically assured that theend of bloodshed was near. The road remained to be cleared, however, for negotiations between the two Mexican factions. Members of the revolutionary junta in Washington expressed doubt whether Carranza would be willing to grant amnesty to the Huertas of the north.

Sweep Aside Difficulties. The crux of the situation appeared to hang on the extent of the quarter that Carranza might be willing to grant his fallen foe. That all stumbling blocks will be swept aside, however, for the peaceful entry of Carranza into the Mexican capital was the belief generally expressed. Secretary of State Bryan successfully. was optimistic over possibilities of

peace. "Watchful waiting," he thought, had resulted in success.

Villa Talks Sense. Fears expressed over the attitude that Villa, the northern military chief, might take toward the new turn in the situation partially were discounted by his statement that there was "no necessity for apprehension regarding my stay in the north." He said he expected to move his troops from Chihuahua State toward Mexico City within the next few days.

One plan for the occupation of Mexico City contemplated that 5,000 troops from each of the three divisions of the Constitutionalist army simultaneously would enter the capital. By that means jealousy among the big units of Carranza's forces would be obviated. From his headquarters in Monterey, Carranza announced his plan of conducting negotiations for establishment of the Constitutionalist Government in Mexico City without further sacrifice of life. He declared, however, that unconditional surrender would be the only basis upon which the parleys could result



Suffragette Slashes Millais' Picture of the Scottish Historian.

Woman Giving Name as Anne Hunt Is Cut by Flying

London, July 17 .- A militant suffragette today slashed with a butcher's arrested after a severe struggle with the attendants and at the police station gave her name as Anne Hunt. Eluded the Guards.

The glass covering on it was smashed and a slit was made in the picture from the top of Carlyle's head right through the face to the chin.

After having for the sake of the city of London stood for many months a series of the most blackguardly attacks ever made by one newspaper against another and its owners, The London Advertiser will enter an action for libel against the London Free Press and Walter J. Blackburn, for a sum not less than \$50,000 and complete retraction of falsehoods pub-

DISCONTINUED CONTROVERSY.

Following the campaign on electrification conducted between the two newspapers, The Advertiser resolved to discontinue newspaper controversy in the interests of the community. As a result the name of the other local newspaper was rigidly excluded from these columns, and not one word of contentious matter was printed. This was done at the solicitation of many businessmen, and in accordance with a letter passed by the London Board of Trade, and sent to the publishers of each newspaper.

The London Free Press continued its attack on The Advertiser. A chain of falsehoods, night after night, sought to injure this newspaper in the minds of the reading public. While many recognized that it was purely a case of a competing company "squealing" about its opposition, others have been deceived by the
