## LINCOLN WANTS TO SELL BIERBAUER TO LONDON

Ex-London First Sacker Fails To Make Good With Western League Club—Schedule Meeting Is Postponed Until Wednesday.

The Lincoln club, of the Western League, has decided to let Louis Bierbauer, the former London first sacker, go. President Jones, of the Lincoln club, wired President Somerville, of the London club, this morning asking what price the London club would pay for Bierbauer. The Western leaguers want to sell the Erie before the 13th of the month when the teams of that league have to get under the players' limit. Louis has been playing first base for Lincoln but has only been playing fair baseball. The regular Lincoln first baseman is pretty solid with the fans, and Manager McIntyre has decided to use him on first base.

**Cannot Pay the Money.**  
The London club would like to get Bierbauer back again, but it cannot pay the salary he would want, and it is not likely he will come here. Louis was getting \$175 per month last season, but the local club could not meet near this figure this season. Bierbauer may go to the Erie club, as Director George O'Neill is sweet on the ex-London star.

## World Lost Great Runner When Cuban Carvajal Quit

He Finished Fourth in St. Louis Marathon After Spending Half an Hour in Apple Orchard During Race—Nothing in Racing Annals To Equal Feet

Without assistance or attendant the unknown Cuban dog-trotted along the course, stopping frequently to beg food and water from the spectators. At one point he spent fully half an hour in a roadside apple orchard. Despite these delays Carvajal finished in fourth place, the freshest of all the runners. It was the general opinion that had he been properly attended and coached he would have won the 1914 Olympic marathon easily.  
Carvajal is a guide and runner for Havana's leading hotel. Still trim and bronzed, he can trot mile after mile with little apparent effort, but admits that he is too old to run in the next international marathon. He expresses regret in a casual way that he was not prepared financially and otherwise to take the race, which he still believes he could have won in easy fashion. Carvajal is conversant with athletics in the United States and Europe, and will spend an evening discussing in broken English the performances of the stars of the United States. One chapter of his athletic career is sealed, however, for Carvajal will not tell how he managed to return to Cuba. He simply shrugs his shoulders and changes the subject when questioned on this point of his invasion of the United States.

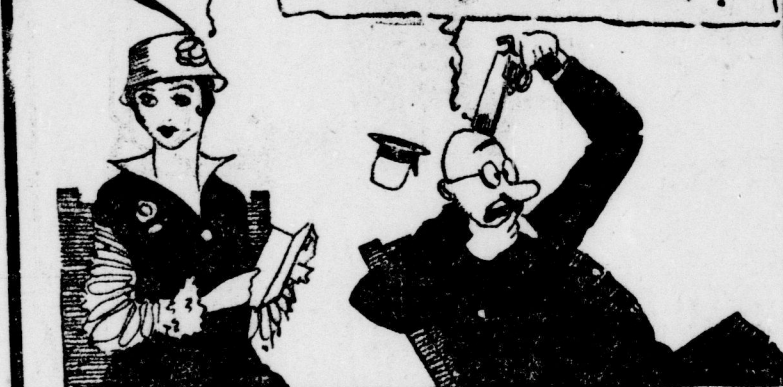
