LIBERALS HONOR SEN. PARDEE AT SARNIA DINNER

Warm Tributes Paid To Popular Member of Upper Chamber.

REPLIES TO RECEPTION

Informs Friends He Is Still in Fight For People's Interests.

SARNIA, April 20.—The very high esteem in which Senator F. F. Pardee is regarded by the Liberals of the constituency of West Lambton was strikingly illustrated tonight, when a company numbering more than 200 prominent Liberals of the riding and visitors from outside points gathered at a banquet in the city hall in honor of Senator Pardee's recent appointment to the Canadian Senate following 14 years faithful and distinguished service in the constituency as its representative, first in the Provincial Legislature, and later as a member in the Dominion house.

The event was one of the most notable in the political history of the constituency, and the remarkable outburst of enthusiasm that greeted Senator Pardee on rising was attributed to his great popularity and a clear expression of appreciation for his long and faithful service.

In the course of several fine addresses a statement by Alex. McQueen of Toronto, vice-president of the Imperial Oil Limited, was remarkable in view of the influence made by Senator Pardee's opponents in the last election, of the effect of free oil on Imperial Oil Limited. Mr. McQueen said there never was a member in the house who did more in the interests of the oil industry than did Senator Pardee for many years.

Senator Pardee Replies.

Senator Pardee spoke briefly, but with all his old fire and enthusiasm. "My friends," he said, "I hardly know how to express my gratitude for the great reception you have accorded me. I start my political career in this constituency back in 1888, and it has been my great honor to represent you for 24 years. We have fought many good battles and, thanks to good Liberal principles, we have won. West Lambton has ever shown its faith in Liberal principles as laid down by the man, the shadow of whose portrait I stand, the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier, one of the greatest, if not the greatest statesman this country ever produced. His successor, Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, is showing by the measures he is introducing the greatest promise, and proving that he will be a worthy successor of the great Sir Wilfrid.

"Ladies and gentlemen, defeat was almost worth while, in the light of the wonderful reception you have given me. I have endeavored to always do the best for the general welfare of the people. But I want to tell you that with my appointment to the Senate I am not out of the fight, am still in the firing line. If by advice or precept I can do anything to further Liberal principles I shall do it. This is, I think, the brightest, happiest and most triumphant moment of my career, and I hardly know how to express my gratitude to you." Ringing cheers were given for Senator Pardee as he resumed his seat.

Flays Group Government.

Thomas Marshall, M.L.A. for Lincoln, depulizing for Wellington Hay, the Liberal leader in the provincial house, unavoidably absent, after paying very high tribute to the worth of the guest of honor, took severely to task the inefficiency of the group system of government, primarily due to lack of experience and legislative ability of the Farmer government in power. He instanced the matter of a loan floated in the fall of 1920 by the provincial treasury, the amount being \$6,000,000 at \$92.75 despite wonderful security. In a month applications for \$16,000,000 were received.

Instead of closing down on the loan at once, the treasury allowed the whole issue to go, the province thereby losing at least \$1,000,000. He referred to investments made by the provincial government amounting to \$75,000,000, costing \$2,000,000 or \$1,000,000 for interest and not revenue-bearing, particularly the T. and N. O. Railway. But opinion was changed, he was convinced, and Liberalism in the province would come into its own.

Mr. Marshall paid a tribute to the organization of the West Lambton Young Liberal Club, and said he had never attended a finer or more enthusiastic gathering in his Liberal career.

Perhaps the most remarkable tribute to the esteem in which Senator Pardee was held was that made by Alex. McQueen of Toronto, vice-president of the Imperial Oil Company, who said he felt much more at home in Liberal company than in Tory Toronto, despite the fact that Senator Pardee was defeated in federal election on the local issue of the effect of free trade on Imperial Oil Ltd. Mr. McQueen stated that for the oil industry there never was a member who did more for the industry than Senator Pardee, who was even now willing to do all possible for oil industry. He felt assured in light of Senator Pardee's connection with the industry he had not received his deserts in last election. This frank announcement from the vice-president of the Imperial Oil Ltd., was significant, and was greeted with great applause.

McCoig Pays Tribute.

Sensor Archie McCoig of Chatham was exceptionally well received, and spoke of his delight at the opportunity to congratulate Senator Pardee at such an occasion. Not only Senator Pardee but the people were to be congratulated on appointment, and it reflected to the credit of the premier and the government that their means of reforming Senate and bringing it nearer to people by appointment of men of Mr. Pardee's ability and record, was one that would be most effective. Senator Pardee would still remain in public life or speaker will be greatly disappointed.

SARNIA, April 20.—More than 200 Liberals from all parts of Ontario tonight paid tributes to Senator Pardee at a banquet given in the city hall in honor of his elevation to the Senate.

Premier King had already endeared himself to people, and had succeeded in surrounding himself with the strongest men of the country in a manner that assured the country's prosperity. He could safely say that had West Lambton returned Senator Pardee at last election, West Lambton would have had as its representative a minister with portfolio. The event was successful in every way from lavish decorations of banquet hall and artistic touches to the tables in the party colors to the catering itself. The Liberal ladies of the city threw themselves enthusiastically into service of West Lambton Young Liberal Club to provide and serve good things and success of the event is in no small measure due to their efforts.

BELIEVE BONUS WILL BE RENEWED

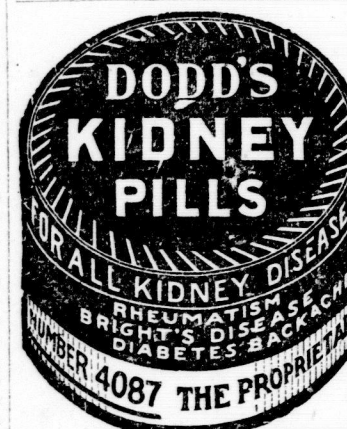

OTTAWA, April 20.—It is rumored tonight, although nothing approaching a direct statement on the subject has been heard from the government, that the civil service bonus which was cut off for the month of April for the first time, will be renewed on all salaries under \$2,500 a year. All salaries above this mark will not receive a bonus, it is stated. It is expected that nothing official will be said on the matter of the civil service bonus by the government until a statement is made in the house, and the civil servants must await such a decision, meanwhile understanding that the matter is receiving the earnest consideration of the government.
