

CLAIMS U. F. O. ATMS "SELFISH"

E. M. Trowern Castigates Farmers For Co-operative Trading Efforts.

Dominion Retail Merchants Want Licenses To Hawkers Restricted.

TORONTO, May 18.—"Selfish and narrow" are the objects of the United Farmers of Ontario Co-operative Company, according to E. M. Trowern, secretary of the Dominion Retail Merchants' Association. In an address here today to the Ontario Retail Grocers' Association at their closing session.

Mr. Trowern said the farmers' trading organizations were trying to discredit the retailer, and if the retailers were abolished there would be a hue and cry for them to come back. No class of men could rise up and run this country, Mr. Trowern declared.

The grocers elected officers as follows: President, D. W. Clark, Toronto (acclamation); first vice-president, John Muir, Niagara Falls; second vice-president, Thomas Collins, Ottawa; third vice-president, W. McCorvie, Chatham; treasurer, P. L. M. Egan, secretary, W. C. Miller, representative to the Dominion convention, B. G. Crabtree, Ottawa.

Resolutions adopted urged: That licenses to hawkers and peddlers be restricted; that retail prices should not be fixed by the manufacturers without consultation with the retailers' association; that application of the 8-hour day to the retail business should be made by the Dominion committee; that prosecution of all cases of fraudulent advertising should be made by the Dominion committee; that the holding of lotteries and guessing contests in an effort to sell merchandise should be discouraged by all reputable merchants.

FINES TORONTO DISTILLERS \$1,000

TORONTO, May 18.—Gooderham & Worts, distillers of this city, were fined \$1,000 and costs by Magistrate Jones today for a breach of the Ontario temperance act. The magistrate found that the defendants had knowledge of the sale of a large quantity of liquor which, though presumably made to a resident of New York State, was in reality made to five residents of this city, the manager of Gooderham & Worts knowing that this was the case.

"At any rate," the magistrate commented, "no evidence was brought to show that they had not full knowledge."

The liquor was seized on the Toronto-Hamilton highway, it being presumably on its way to the border at the time in a motor truck.

BORN IN TORONTO, NOT A CANADIAN

MONTREAL, May 18.—"Are you a Canadian by birth?" Chief Justice Decarie asked Thomas Gorman, charged with theft, this afternoon. "No, your lordship," was the reply. "I was born in Toronto." Gorman, who had been caught red-handed by the mayor of St. Lambert and who is over 60 years of age, was freed on suspended sentence.

Chatham Secures Site For Incinerator Plant.

Special to London Advertiser. CHATHAM, May 18.—The city of Chatham, in its quest for a site for the new civic incinerator, believes now that the end is in sight. According to reports current at the city hall this morning there are prospects of land being purchased from the township of Harwich close to the east end of the city. Negotiations for the purchase of the land in question are stated to be under way and that a definite proposition will be made at the city council meeting on Monday evening next.

STREET CAR CUTS TRUCK AT SARNIA

D. Hislop, Motor Driver, Sustains Severe Out On the Head.

Special to London Advertiser. SARNIA, May 18.—Sarnia's first one-man street car met with disaster this afternoon. The remodelled car was making the run to the beach and approached the western gate of the Athletic Park from which issued a motor truck driven by D. Hislop. A collision was inevitable and the front end of the street car struck the truck in the side and practically destroyed it. The street car front end was very badly damaged. The driver of the truck sustained a severe cut on the head.

According to a statement made public here today, the C. H. Wills Company of Marysville, Mich., show an increase of business that warrants the taking over of the Illinois Tool Company premises located immediately behind the Wills plant. The Canadian site of the Wills Company is located south of Sarnia, adjoining the property of the Dominion Alloy Steel Corporation, and while no definite date has been set for development of the Canadian site, it is stated in well informed circles in this city that the development must come before long.

FIND BODY AFTER 9-MONTH SEARCH

Special to London Advertiser. CHATHAM, May 18.—The body of the late Will Stevens, a son of the late N. H. Stevens, and a former resident of this city, has been recovered from Chestermere Lake, near Calgary, Alberta, according to an advice received in the city today by Harry Stevens, a brother of the deceased. The late Will Stevens was a prominent citizen of Calgary, and was an ardent hunter. He lost his life while out hunting last October. While swimming out in the lake to get some ducks he had shot he was seized with cramps and sank. Previous efforts to locate the body had been of no avail.

THIRTY-ONE CALLED TO BAR. TORONTO, May 18.—Thirty-one graduates of the Ontario Law School were called to the Bar at Osgoode Hall today. Among them was Charles Albert Massey, winner of the Chancellor Van Koughnet Scholarship and Gold Medal.

O. T. A. OPERATOR ADMITS FRAME-UP

Tells Committee Owen Sound Man Fined \$500 Was Innocent.

TORONTO, May 18.—Thomas Joynt of Shallow Lake and Owen Sound was convicted some time ago of selling liquor and fined \$500 on the testimony of H. H. McCutcheon and another operator.

McCutcheon admitted in his evidence before a committee of the legislature that this was a "frame up," that they had not bought the liquor from Joynt at all.

Mr. Joynt today told the committee that he told the court at the time that "it was robbery," that he had never sold the liquor, but they fined him just the same. His lawyer is now taking steps to get the money

back. He admitted he had been convicted of being drunk four times, but claimed it was because of a feud between himself and License Inspector Beckett.

"I have no use for him and he has no use for me," he said, and witness claimed that Beckett hounded him. "Then you claim that in all these cases you were convicted although innocent?" Attorney-General Raney asked. "I always said," he replied carefully, "I've beaten Beckett as often as he has beaten me."

Magistrate A. L. Creaser, Owen Sound, was referred to by Attorney-General Raney as one of the best magistrates in the province, but the witness was emphatic in taking the opposite view of this magistrate.

KITCHENER MEN GET JAIL TERMS

KITCHENER, May 18.—John Cain and Roy Meyer, charged with abduction, were found guilty in police court this morning by Magistrate Weir, and sentenced to one month in the county jail.
