It could be done, but he would favor extending it over a two-year period, in order that sufficient work would be forthcoming for the organization. The question has yet to be decided, however, by the council, as Ald. May's motion to use the city London bill for this purpose comes up at the next regular session of the council, after the election.

tives of Miss Presley today and they said that, to their knowledge, the young man who was with her Thursday night did not make any threat. Mrs. Presley of Thorndale, mother of e, knew her daughter was safe with London relatives, and during the past few days has often been in communication with her over longdistance telephone.
