

PROGRESSIVE VICTORY IN MOOSE JAW CONCEDED

PROGRESSIVE IS LEADING IN 110 OUT OF 146 POLLS

E. W. Hopkins Has Majority of 1,291 in Moose Jaw By-Election.

MAY CUT FIGURES

Liberals Not Willing Yet To Concede Opponents Election.

Canadian Press Despatch. Moose Jaw, Sask., April 11.—With the election to parliament of E. N. Hopkins, Progressive, over Hon. W. B. Knowles, Liberal, conceded by almost everyone, interest today centres in Mr. Hopkins' majority. In the election of 1921, R. M. Johnson, Progressive, whose disqualification by the courts brought about yesterday's by-election, had a majority of 229 over Mr. Knowles, and this morning it was estimated by Progressive workers that Mr. Hopkins' lead would be at least as great.

On the latest figures available the Progressive's majority was 1,291. Canadian Press Despatch. Moose Jaw, Sask., April 11.—Liberals headquarters is not yet prepared to concede the election of E. N. Hopkins, the Progressive candidate, in yesterday's by-election although 110 polls out of 146 show him to be leading his Liberal opponent, W. B. Knowles, K.C., by a majority of 1,291.

The belated returns are from remote districts in the south, and Liberals anticipate when these figures are in they will reduce Hopkins' majority. Complete returns from Moose Jaw City give Hopkins 2,670, and Knowles 3,808.

It is not expected that complete returns will be known until a late hour. From the south country especially, where Knowles' supporters expect to overcome Hopkins' lead, very few returns have been received.

Death intervened at Victoria School polling sub-division in Moose Jaw City, and prevented John Fraser, old timer, from casting his ballot. He entered the polling booth this afternoon to vote, and was suddenly stricken with an attack of heart failure.

BOY POSSESSING STILL DISMISSED BY COURT

Brantford Magistrate Gives Benefit of Doubt to Samuel Swartski.

Special to The Advertiser. Brantford, April 11.—Samuel Swartski, the youth charged with entering the revenue department with having purchased a still for the manufacture of liquor, was given the benefit of the doubt in police court today and the charge dismissed.

Magistrate John Blake, after hearing all the evidence submitted, decided that the burden was on the crown to prove that the boy had not acted in good faith, when he purchased the alleged still. He stated that there was nothing to show that he had intended to use it for illegal purpose, and thought that, as he insisted it was for use as an oil can, he should be given the benefit of the doubt, and allowed to go.

Swartski was arrested some time ago as he left the customs office with a copper container under his arm, after having the vessel cleared through the customs. He was arrested by inland revenue officers.

STATES ESKIMO IDEAS LIKE SIR CONAN DOYLE'S

Young Arctic Explorer Describes Beliefs Held by North People.

Special to The Advertiser. Toronto, April 11.—The Eskimo idea of the spirit world, conveys very largely to Conan Doyle's theory, according to Harold Noice of Seattle, youthful Arctic explorer, and authority in Eskimo language and customs, now visiting Toronto with Vilhjalmur Stefansson.

"Behind all real persons and things they think there is a psychic person or thing," Noice declared. "Every act in Eskimo life is of supernatural significance. They have practically no belief firmly in a spirit world, but ghosts wander through shadowland after death. Like Conan Doyle they believe spirits carry on the same pursuits as do mortals."

SCOTCH LASSIES QUICKLY PLACED IN SITUATIONS

Ten Immigrant Girls Arrived Yesterday Afternoon Under Salvation Army Patronage.

THE THIRD GROUP

Superior Type of Young Women To Engage in Domestic Employment.

Within an hour after ten bright-eyed girls from Scotland arrived in London for domestic work yesterday every one had been placed in positions.

Adjutant Smith, of the Salvation Army, journeyed to Toronto Tuesday to convey the young women here. They represent the third group to come to Western Ontario in the past two months.

If the last consignment are samples of what this section of the province will receive during the year, householders desiring domestic help will consider themselves very fortunate.

All are sturdy, animated and ambitious. They fell in love with Canada the minute they arrived at St. John, and the zest with which they entered into their new life was commendable.

The story they have to tell of the old country is not a bright one. Unemployment has prevailed in the Highlands for two long years. In many instances their fathers and members of the family have been barely existing on the unemployment grant furnished by the government.

According to Adjutant Smith, who discussed old country conditions with the girls, the situation is chronic. Great Britain is in the throes of unrest caused by industrial depression. Naturally the young women looked for a haven of contentment.

Their chances in this country, they believe, are innumerable, and the pondance of males leads them to believe that they will find a better life here. With the coming of many others during the summer, the demand will be partly filled. The desire to oblige and general proficiency and good spirits of Scottish women makes them eminently desirable in the best homes.

Eight of the group arriving yesterday had been in Scotland, so broad, in fact, that only one familiar with their grammatical peculiarities can hope to fathom the tongue.

Police Arrest Stranger In Go-Home-Bay Cottage

Constable Fenton Is Confronted With Revolver as He Enters Summer Home of Dr. A. H. Abbott of Toronto.

Penetang, Ont., April 11.—A drama of the wilds of the Georgian Bay was unfolded here yesterday with the arrival of Constable Frank Fenton, who lives on the shore of Go-Home Bay, north of Penetang and Midland, where some 70 summer cottages, owned principally by members of the Toronto University faculty, are situated. Constable Fenton was accompanied by his wife and they brought with them a prisoner caught in the summer cottage of Dr. A. H. Abbott, secretary of the Red Cross Society, Toronto. The man gives his name as Sidney Watson, but refuses further information.

According to the story told by Constable Fenton, he saw snowshoe tracks leading to Dr. Abbott's cottage. Accompanied by his wife and their dog, he approached the building. The dog was sent into the cottage and quickly uncoiled the intruder. Suddenly a man's hand holding a revolver, popped past the door, and Fenton, who had his shot-gun with him, let fly and hit the hand. The revolver dropped to the ground, and the man was taken into custody.

Mrs. Fenton rendered first aid to the prisoner and he was placed on a dog sled and taken into Penetang. The prisoner is now in Penetang Hospital. It is reported that a number of other cottages have been entered.

The name, "Ottawa" was the family name of the late Lady Beck.

PRESENTS TOTAL CHARGE AGAINST CANADIAN LINES

Information Presented in Commons on the Request of W. D. Euler.

CONSTRUCTION COSTS

National Transcontinental Total Amount Chargeable to Capital Is \$169,090,121.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, April 11.—The total charges against the railways now comprises in the Canadian National Railways by way of cost of construction, equipment and deficits, are as follows: Construction, \$587,164,660; equipment, \$87,547,063; deficits, \$122,053,646; fixed charges, \$146,227,284. This information was tabled in the House in reply to questions asked by W. D. Euler (Liberal, North Waterloo). The total amount chargeable to capital is \$674,111,723.99.

Of the above total the former Canadian Northern Railway is charged with the following: Capital, \$138,954,249; equipment, \$38,081,827; deficits, \$21,003,292; fixed charges, \$100,680,231. The Grand Trunk Pacific is charged with: Capital, \$37,612,074; equipment, \$6,417,729; deficits, \$25,888,065; fixed charges, \$26,623,165.

Charges against the Grand Trunk System are: Capital, \$37,612,443; equipment, \$7,246,495; deficits, \$21,788,516; fixed charges, \$17,913,886.

National Transcontinental total charges are: Capital, \$169,090,121.55; deficits, \$16,277,168.75; intercolonial and equipment, including equipment of the National Transcontinental, \$38,801,009.65; deficit, \$36,911,604.57.

EXPECT JULY POPULATION OF U.S. TO BE 110,663,502

Special to The Advertiser. Washington, April 11.—Population of the United States will be 110,663,502 on July 1, 1923, according to an estimate today by census bureau statisticians.

The country's population is increasing at the rate of 1,415,109 annually. This would give a total of 119,861,710 by the time the next census is taken in 1930. The 1920 census showed a population of 104,710,620.

FOUR PRISONERS ESCAPE ASYLUM; STILL AT LARGE

Bind and Gag Nightwatchman, Then Rob Him of His Keys.

Associated Press Despatch. Mattewan, N. Y., April 11.—Four prisoners at the Mattewan State Hospital for Criminal Insane made their escape early today. They overpowered a night watchman, bound and gagged him and robbed him of his keys. They next overpowered a guard who had the keys to the garage, from which they stole an automobile belonging to the superintendent of the institution, and drove north, carrying the guard with them as far as Poughkeepsie, sixteen miles north of here, where they dropped him.

CONTRACT IS NOW LET FOR NEW MONASTERY

New Home of Redemptorist Fathers Expected To Cost About \$60,000.

The new monastery of the Redemptorist Fathers which is to be built on Dundas street east, is to be the last word in modern construction according to R. J. Fuller of the John V. Gray Construction Company, Limited, to whom the contract has been awarded by the architects Watt and Blackwell.

The monastery will be a handsome two-story building, 86 feet long and 42 feet 10 inches wide. The whole exterior will be finished in the highest grade of pressed brick and cut stone trimming. Birch and Georgia Pine will be used throughout in the interior of the building and the floors will be of oak.

The bathrooms will be equipped with tile floors and walls, and the general fitting of the whole house, both in plumbing fixtures and in electric fittings, will be in keeping with the exterior and general construction of the building. The cost is estimated at \$55,000 to \$60,000.

The John V. Gray Construction Company, with branches in Toronto, London, Windsor, and Halleybury, is particularly well equipped to handle this contract, said Mr. Fuller, and the firm will, as far as possible, use local labor and local material, while the whole of the work will be handled in different departments. All returns coming under this class must be filed by April 30.

To Cross Ocean In Three-Master

General Cornelius Vanderbilt Plans Interesting Trip.

New York, April 11.—Brigadier-General Cornelius Vanderbilt, accompanied by three friends, will begin a transoceanic trip Saturday in his three-masted schooner yacht Atlantic. His companions will be Captain Jas. F. Carter, U. S. N.; Henry Worthington Bullant and James D. Sparkman. The first port of call will be Hamilton, Bermuda.

PEOPLE PROTEST VISIT OF KING TO THE POPE

Ten Thousand Gather at Albert Hall Today in Big Demonstration.

Associated Press Despatch. London, April 11.—Ten thousand people attended a meeting at Albert Hall today to protest against the proposed visit of the king to the pope. Lord Gishborough presided. A telegram was sent by the gathering to his majesty, expressing loyal greetings, and humbly praying that he might forego his projected visit to the Vatican. The telegram stated that the king's visit to the pope would be a cause of sorrow to millions of his majesty's Protestant subjects. The gathering passed a resolution, calling on the government to withdraw the Vatican envoy, were always in danger.
