Changes Are Being Made on Dundas, Richmond and Wharncliffe Road.

COVER WHOLE CITY

Complete Change Could Be Carried Out in Three or Four Years.

The new system being installed consists of center-suspended lights in prismatic globes, similar to those which

It is the intention of the council and the commission to entirely replace the present system with the new prismatic globe system over a period of three or four years. The cost of the gradual installation of the new system is to be forne by the commission through money from its depreciation reserve funds.

At the request of the council the commission outlined a scheme for improvmission outlined a scheme for improving the street lighting system, and in turn requested the council to name the streets upon which the new system should be installed first. The council named Richmond street,

north of Dufferin avenue; Dundas street, east of Waterloo street, and Wharncliffe south of Stanley street.

"For billing purposes it is proposed to charge \$35 a lamp a year for the 600-candlepower lamps at the street intersections, and \$28 a lamp a year for the 400-candlepower lamps in the center of





Proposed Provincial Levy Dropped. Streets and bridges, paid for by!

itizens of London, are being used daily by motorists from outside the city. London has thoroughfares which are worth more than two and a half million dollars. Towards this sum the province of Ontario has not contributed a dollar. The streets and ridges have been provided solely by ndoners, and figures given at the city engineer's office show that Lon-doners have paid well for their

On top of this expenditure, London has been ordered to pay to the prov-ince \$204,000 for suburban paving, paving of provincial roads outside

But, according to council attitude, and plans being pushed to prevent it, the whole problem becomes a bit too thick when a gasoline tax is imposed on motorists, so that the province of Ontario will benefit to the extent of three cents on every gallon of gaso-line sold in Otario. The province, according to present plans, will get all the gasoline tax and the cities nothing. This stand has aroused a group of Londoners to act.

Cut Charges.

London has protested against this proposal and has asked the provincial government to share the gaseline tax or cut the suburban road paving charges. Cities and towns all over the province have written supporting London's protests.

Through the gasoline tax, London-ers would contribute probably \$50,000 annually to the coffers of the province—to help pay for good roads outside of the city. The tax is all for the use of outside roads. There is nothing to help paving in London London owns and maintains 145 miles of streets, including nearly 50 miles of paved streets and 129 miles of curbs and gutters.
