

CONSTABLE FOOLS ROBBERY, CATCHES THUG British Sub Is Located On Sea Bed, But 68 Men Must Die

OFFICER ON BEAT NABS THUG SINGLE-HANDED

Alexander Cameron, 21, Captured by P. C. George Pilgrim in the Act of Breaking Into Fur Store, Pleads Guilty in Court to Three Serious Charges.

ADMITS CAR THEFT AND ROBBERY OF GARAGE

Caught in the act of sawing the bars on the rear door of Ross, Limited, by Constable George Pilgrim at 3:30 this morning, Alexander Cameron, 21, of Byron, pleaded guilty in police court this morning to three charges preferred against him and elected summary trial by Magistrate Graydon.

He was remanded to jail for one week to await sentence. A complete burglar's outfit of saws and jimmies was exhibited in court.

The three charges to which Cameron pleaded guilty were: That he did unlawfully attempt to enter the store of Ross, Limited, that he did have in his possession a kit of burglar's tools, and that he did, earlier in the evening, unlawfully enter the garage of Lorne Brock of Byron and steal a touring car and \$25.26.

Smart Piece of Work.
The capture of Cameron was an excellent piece of work on the part of Constable Pilgrim. The policeman was making his rounds at the rear of the Dundas street stores, unaccompanied. He had reached the rear door of the Olympia candy shop when he heard the grating noise of a saw being used on iron bars.

Deciding to take no chances, the constable removed his gun from the holster and investigated. He had only gone a few steps farther when he saw Cameron sawing one of the bars on the door.

His approach was unnoticed by Cameron, who kept right on working. When the policeman came within a few feet of the burglar he made a noise with his foot and commanded Cameron to put his hands up. Cameron quickly turned around, raising his arms as he did so.

"Well, I guess you got me," he said to the policeman, as he held out his hands to have the cuffs put on. On his way to the station, Cameron asked to go to his car and get his coat. The car was parked on Queen's avenue, and Cameron admitted that he had stolen it earlier in the evening from a Byron garage. He also told the policeman that he was breaking into Ross' merely to get a fur coat for his girl.

When searched at the police station, the money which he had stolen earlier in the evening, along with the car from the Byron garage, was recovered.

Cameron pleading guilty, no evidence was taken in court this morning. He declared that he had nothing to say in his defense and asked Magistrate Graydon to sentence him. When arrested, Cameron was in the

act of sawing another bar on the outside door. He had already removed one, and had drilled several holes in the inner door in an attempt to make an opening large enough for his hand to go through and manipulate the lock.

Cameron has appeared in court several times and is well-known to the police. They believe that Cameron is the man who this summer slew seven foxes in the Springbank 200 for their skins.

A Midnight Visit.
Cameron entered the garage at Byron between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning. He gained entry by prying open the front window into the office. Before going to the back to get the car, he emptied the till in the office. The garage is owned by Lorne Brock, and the car which was stored there was owned by Carl Little of Byron sanatorium. The theft was not discovered by the proprietor till he opened the garage this morning. He was present in police court and secured an order for the return of the car and money.

Cameron, who is a big fellow, chiefly distinguished by his mass of black curly hair, appeared in court this morning wearing a gray suit and minus a collar and tie. He appeared perfectly calm.

The magistrate read the three charges to him and explained that he might elect summary trial by him or else be tried by judge and jury at the next assizes.

"By judge," was Cameron's answer. The magistrate then explained to him that the matter of whether he wished a jury was decided only when he appeared before the county judge.

"How do you elect trial, by me or by judge and jury?" the magistrate asked again.

Summary Trial.
"By judge, by you," was Cameron's answer. "How do you plead, guilty or not guilty?" Magistrate Graydon queried.

"Guilty, sir," was the answer. "Have you anything to say in your defense?" the prisoner was asked.

"Nothing, sir," he said. The crown attorney then asked the crown attorney if he wished to say anything.

"I would ask a week's remand that I might procure certain facts in regard to this man's career," said Mr. Judd. "I believe he has been in trouble before."

"I will remand you to jail one week for sentence," said the magistrate, and Cameron was led back to the cells.

ST. THOMAS WILL VOTE TO REPLACE TROLLEY SYSTEM

City Council Approves Bylaw Which Would Inaugurate Buses.

ELECTION DEC. 7

Special Meeting Ratifies Agreement to Give Motors a Tryout.

St. Thomas, Nov. 13.—Election of this city will be asked to vote on a bylaw at the local elections Dec. 7 carrying two clauses, the first to do away with a municipal street railway, and the second providing for the establishment of a motorbus system to care for the transportation needs of the community.

The decision to bring the street railway question to a show down was made at a special meeting of the city council last night. The body ratified an agreement with a Canadian bus company, whereby motors will be given a tryout on city streets and the framework of the double-barreled bylaw which will be submitted to the people.

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The municipal railway has shown deficits ever since it first began operations and its rolling stock is in a deplorable state at the present time. The subject and accord was finally reached when the plan was proposed to do away with the road entirely, substituting a modern bus system.

Luxor, Nov. 12.—The mummy of Tutankhamen is that of a boy king, who died at an age of probably not more than sixteen.

This information came at the end of a strenuous day's work by the archaeologists, during which jewels and treasures were revealed in quantities that even Howard Carter and the other experts were bewildered at the sight of them.

This was the day of all days in the Valley of the Kings. Secretly, the inner coffin of Tutankhamen had been carried on a covered stretcher to the tomb of Seti, the second tomb in the extreme corner of the royal necropolis, and today, with only two tourists venturing through the deathly heat to the valley—there snapping each other in apparent self-defense, ignorant of the drama being enacted—came the unwrapping of the mummy.

Tutankhamen had been X-rayed, privately, so that some hint of what was to come was known to a privileged few.

But the dark splashes on the photographic plates taken through the burial cloth could give but the merest hint of the unimaginable splendor, dwarfing all that has gone before and that so excited the world three years ago.

Find Beyond All Dreams.
"No living man ever dreamed of such a find as this," declared one of the spectators to me at the close of the day's work. And there is more to come.

Howard Carter and his assistants began their work with the mummy's feet. The head is still wrapped in hundreds of feet of fine linen. The most fascinating question of all, whether upon the brow rests the crown of upper or lower Egypt, is therefore still unsolved.

Carter, with his invariable painstaking, scientific carefulness, refused to be hurried in his work. Tonight the officials who came to Luxor to witness the unwrapping on behalf of the Egyptian government—Director of Antiquities Lacau, the governor of Kena province, Drs. Derry and Selch Hanly Bey, government radiologists, and Selch Hanly Pasha, under-secretary of public works—had planned to return to Cairo with this point in doubt, knowing only that a prophetic on the brow indicates a diadem, if not a crown, that considering the splendor of the other jewels and royal regalia already discovered, must indeed be marvellous.

Just before train time, Prof. Lacau and Dr. Hanly cancelled their reservations and decided to remain at Luxor another day, in order to witness the completion of the unwrapping of the mummy tomorrow.

It had been hoped that this secret unwrapping, which Egyptian officials who enforced their will upon Carter and his assistants, sought by every means possible to conceal from the world, could be completed last night. So careful were the measures taken.

King Tut, 15, and Crowned With Gold, Disclosed Today

WATER TOO DEEP TO MAKE RESCUE OF SUB POSSIBLE

British Craft Reported Located Off Devonshire Coast—68 Men Imprisoned.

NO HINT OF COLLISION

Tragedy Is Greatest in Annals of Undersea Ships—Has Signalling Apparatus.

Associated Press Despatch. Plymouth, England, Nov. 13.—The submarine M-1 was located today on the bed of the sea twelve miles southwest of Start Point. The M-1 which disappeared during manoeuvres in the English channel yesterday morning, is said to be lying at too great a depth to permit diving operations or operations to bring her to the surface. The ship's crew numbers 64 men.

The naval rescue ships are reported to have ascertained that the M-1 had not suffered from any collision, and for this reason, it is thought the men on board may be still alive.

If they are, experts say, they are likely to face a terrible lingering death, the boat is so deep that a size and lying in too deep water to permit raising her.

The tragedy is one of the greatest in the history of the British submarine service. So far as can be recalled, the crew of M-1—68 officers and men—is the largest ever involved in an accident aboard an English submarine.

Lieut.-Commander Alec Murray, who was in charge of the ill-starred craft, had a distinguished service record, although only 30 years of age. He was married eleven months ago and a five-week-old son.

Many Are Married.
Many of the others of the crew are married. One petty officer, George Morgan, has a family of seven children, the oldest eleven years, and the youngest two months.

The depth of the water at the point where the M-1 is reported to have been located is about 240 feet, and experts doubt as to whether the submarine can withstand pressure at that depth.

While there should be a sufficient supply of air in the boat to support life for two or three days, no oil has been found on the surface, as might have been expected if any of the crew were alive and able to release it.

The missing monitor submarine M-1 may have become fouled in the wreckage of one of the many vessels sent to the bottom of the English channel by German submarines during the war.

This theory was advanced in naval circles today in the absence of all trace of the giant undersea craft. Continued on Page 4, Column 6.

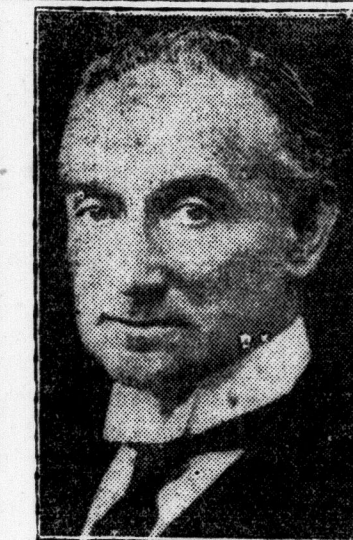

WORK OF "ISSIN" MAKES PROGRESS

Dr. Galbraith Goes to Queen's University to Consult With Scientists.

Progress is being made in the laboratory production of "issin" by Dr. W. T. Galbraith and associates of this city. Issin is claimed by its discoverers to be a preventive and cure for cancer.

Renewed interest has been aroused in the local research work by the announcement of a lead cure by Prof. W. Blair Bell of Liverpool University.

As in the case of Prof. Blair, the local men state that their claims are based on results, and only the difficulty of obtaining issin in larger quantities prevents it being made available for public distribution.

When a more practicable method is found of producing the substance, the distribution will be turned over to the federal department of health. Dr. Galbraith left the city today for Kingston, where he will consult with scientists of Queen's University who have manifested interest in his work. He will go to England shortly after Christmas.

BLAMED AS OVER-CAUTIOUS, WRECK ENGINEER'S REPLY

E. J. Carroll Answers Carelessness Charge of Pennsylvania Railway Official.

CRASH KILLED TEN

Associated Press Despatch. Plainville, N. J., Nov. 13.—E. J. Carroll, engineer of the Mercantile Express, crack train of the Pennsylvania system, which crashed into the rear of another train here yesterday morning, taking ten lives, is wholly to blame for the tragedy. Superintendent F. D. Davis of the New Jersey division of the road, declared today.

Engineer Carroll is guilty of carelessness in running past a red signal light, the superintendent charged. In answer, Carroll asserted that he did not see the light on account of the heavy fog, and adds further that he had previously been reprimanded for over-cautiousness in not making up lost time.

The toll of deaths today had reached ten and the list of injured was 29. The dead are: G. Y. Allen, Bloomfield, N. J.; M. A. Autesta, Schenectady, N. Y.; E. W. Bates, Baltimore, Md.; Arthur Gross, Schenectady, N. Y.; John C. Horstman, Schenectady, N. Y.

General clearing of the wreckage could not be started for seven and a half hours, because Arthur Gross was still alive and pinned in his berth. He was given water through a rubber tube, and last rites were administered by a priest. He died in a hospital.

REAL ESTATE MEN ARE JAILED ON CONTEMPT CHARGE

Failure To Pay \$650 by Court Put London Men and Caradoc Farmer in Durance.

UNIQUE IN LONDON

One Agent Pays Share Into Court, But All Are Held Till Cash Appears.

Failing to pay \$650 as ordered by the supreme court of Ontario has resulted in Alfred Taylor, Caradoc farmer, and two London real estate men being placed behind the bars at the county jail, where they will stay until they have paid the debt or got a further hearing by the supreme court.

One real estate dealer offered his share of the \$650, but it is stated that officials refused to accept it, declaring the full amount must be paid or all three men would go to jail for contempt of court.

On order of Sheriff Donald Graham, the men were arrested last yesterday afternoon and lodged in the cells. Efforts to obtain their freedom have met with no success on the part of lawyers.

Like Bond Case.
The case is a parallel in a small way with that of Aemilius Jarvis and Peter Smith, the court finding that both men must remain in jail until fines had been paid and money restored.

It has been many years since the county jail has housed prisoners jailed for contempt of court in that they did not accede to court judgment.

In the spring of 1924 Mr. Justice Rose presided over the action brought by Edgar Evitts of Manor Park against Taylor and the real estate dealers. Giving evidence in court, Evitts declared that he had been lured into a real estate deal whereby Taylor and the real estate agent had obtained his comfortable home in Manor Park for a sand farm in Caradoc owned by Taylor and gave a mortgage on the farm for the balance of the purchase price and farm stock and equipment.

Farm Ordered Returned.
Evitts, his wife and family gave evidence as to the farm and what it would produce. Evidence went to show that the unfortunate plaintiff had been deceived by Taylor and the real estate dealers. Giving evidence in court, Evitts declared that he had been lured into a real estate deal whereby Taylor and the real estate agent had obtained his comfortable home in Manor Park for a sand farm in Caradoc owned by Taylor and gave a mortgage on the farm for the balance of the purchase price and farm stock and equipment.

The sum was set at \$1,000, being the amount of a mortgage Taylor had raised against the farm, less \$350, the value of crop which Taylor had lost when he relinquished the farm.

Money Not Paid.
The money was never paid, and George Moorhead, of Winnett, Moorhead & Neely, brought the matter up in weekly court some six weeks ago before Mr. Justice Meredith. The latter ordered payment and a jail term in the alternative for contempt of court.

Every effort was made to give defendants an opportunity to pay, but two out of the three could not raise the necessary amount and, despite getting of the money, orders were given to carry out the judgment of Chief Justice Meredith.

In such actions, where more than one defendant appear, all are responsible for the total amount, it was explained, and for that reason the share of one defendant could not be satisfied.

Such commitments have been rare in London, one local lawyer stated. He does not remember a similar case in this city, declaring that he has seen men sent to jail for impertinence to magistrates and judges, and labelled "contempt of court," but never for failure to obey a court order, such as the one delivered by the chief justice.

SPAIN STILL DETERMINED TO CRUSH RIFF REVOLT

Associated Press Despatch. Tetuan, Spanish Morocco, Nov. 13.—The Riffians yesterday raided and destroyed two Spanish camps at Beni Sali, near Tetuan. The number of casualties is unknown.

General Primo di Rivera, head of the Spanish military operations, interviewed, said it was no longer a case of a few tribes rebelling against the Spanish government, but a general uprising against the Spanish government.

ROW 'COMPLETELY STIFLED'
SPANISH OFFICIALS CLAIM

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, Nov. 13.—The Spanish embassy here announced today that the trouble in Spain has been "completely stifled."

The movement was confined to army officers in Madrid, Barcelona and Saragossa, who were dissatisfied with the distribution of rewards for service in Morocco.

SALES TAX LICENSES IN CITY NUMBER 304

There are 304 sales tax licenses in the city of London, according to a booklet received at the customs house this morning. The holder and line of business for every license issued in the dominion is listed. Such licenses are required only by manufacturers and wholesalers.

APPEAL BOARD HERE MONDAY.

On Monday morning the federal board of appeals will be here, hearing the 24 cases which have accumulated in this city of late. The sessions will be held in the court-house.

Portland Doctor Renews \$500 Offer For Person Who Can Get Secret Countersign From Dead Wife—Envelope With Key Opened For First Time in Eight Years.

Associated Press Despatch. New York, Nov. 13.—Although professional and amateur mediums have fared in two tests to prove they have established communication with his dead wife, Dr. J. Allen Gilbert, of Portland, Oregon, will continue his offer of \$500 for a proven message.

In all 290 psychics were represented in the bundle of messages opened yesterday at the offices of the Scientific American, which is co-operating in the test. None of them, however, contained the secret countersign agreed upon between Dr. and Mrs. Gilbert before her death and kept under seal since in an envelope, triple-sealed and then locked in a safety deposit vault.

It was opened yesterday for the first time to compare the offerings of the mediums.

The offering which Dr. Gilbert had made was a sealed envelope, containing three envelopes and three dates, these to be the birth of Dr. Gilbert, the birth of Mrs. Gilbert, the birth of their daughter Dorothy, and the corresponding dates.

The \$500 offer is still open to any medium obtaining the correct dates through the medium's spirit.

The answers submitted varied from wrong dates, names, flowers, poetry, biblical quotations and other information. One answer received by telegram from Ithaca, N.Y., just before the envelope was opened read: "We have the wildest dreams, the most perfect flower and the largest number of birds in the month of May."
