URGENT LEARNERS TO CONTINUE WITH ATHLETIC CLUB

Continued from page one. The matter of a board of trustees to supervise the monetary matters of the club was then discussed. It was pointed out that with such a board of responsible business men the immediate necessity of incorporation would be done away with. On motion the following board of trustees was appointed, pro tem, subject to the approval of the association at a whole, the mayor of the town always to act as chairman of the board: Judge McIntyre for a period of one year; David Champoux, for a period of two years; B. A. Stewart for a period of three years and A. T. LeBlanc for a period of four years. As each trustee's term expires he may be re-elected by the club or the vacancy filled by another according to the vote of the members.

On motion it was decided that the executive be authorized to appoint the necessary number of auditors to canvass the town thoroughly in a campaign for members. The meeting also formerly authorized the secretary to call a meeting of the club's executive for Friday evening and in the event of a quorum of the committee not being present further empowered him to a general meeting of the association for Monday evening next when new officers could be elected if this procedure was deemed necessary.

There is no doubt but what the outlook for the sport project now looks much more promising. The membership campaign will no-doubt be launched very shortly and with the club's undertakings in regard to the raising of funds, made legally safe by the appointment of a reliable board of trustees no one can have any fear of losing a membership fee, or in fact any contribution they desire to make.
