HIGH SCHOOL CONVOCATION AT NEW CARLISLE

BRILLIANT GATHERING AND IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY MARK MEMORABLE EVENT THERE

Dr. Parmelee Congratulated School and Staff On Their Marked Success In The Provincial Examinations—Hon. John Hall Kelly, Rev. deGrouchy P. Emile Cote and Others Spoke Encouragingly—A Lengthy List Of Prize Winners—Presentations To Principal Harold McOuat And Tribute Paid His Work On The Coast.

The annual High School Convocation at New Carlisle, on the 21st inst., was especially brilliant this year because of two distinctions: This School is amongst the foremost in the Province in its examination record. Of twenty-five pupils presented, twenty-four passed. Relatively to the number of pupils presented it may be that this constitutes a record for 1925. Secondly many prominent men honored the Convocation with their presence and encouragement. There were upon the platform Dr. Parmelee, Deputy Minister of the Department of Public Instruction, The Hon. John Hall Kelly, M. L. A., Mr. Paul Emile Cote, M. P. F., the local clergy, Mr. J. S. Gordon, Manager of the Railway, Mr. J. R. Hughes, Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Mr. J. B. S. Mitchell, Mr. G. P. LeGrand, Mr. E. W. Sheppard, County Sheriff, The Rev. L. J. King, Inspector of Schools, Members of School Board, Mr. J. Harold McOuat, Principal of the High School, and others.

The Resolution

That this meeting, representative of the school district and to some extent of the whole constituency which our High School and our School Residence seek to serve, would hereby express and accordingly does its genuine appreciation of the services of Mr. McOuat to the cause of education upon this Coast during the term of his principalship of our High School.

Mr. McOuat is eminently a teacher, an organizer and a disciplinarian. He has brought our school to its present fine position. He has introduced and nurtured a school spirit, an esprit de corps that is most valuable. The results obtained in the Provincial Examinations are but one though a very splendid example of the services he has rendered.

Great Gathering.
The Parish Hall was filled to capacity, main floor and gallery. Mr. J. C. Gilker, Chairman of the School Board, presided.

Dr. Parmelee.
After the prizes had been awarded addresses were delivered, the chief speaker being Dr. Parmelee. The doctor told us of a meeting with the New Carlisle people held thirty-three years ago, when he, with the late Dr. Robins, conducted an Institute for a whole week. The doctor congratulated the school and the staff in that they had achieved such marked success in the recent Provincial Examinations, and encouraged us to go on, with the assurance that the Government is sympathetic, and that he is himself in full accord with all our aspirations.

Thereafter with cheers and the National Anthem this really splendid meeting was concluded.
Prior to the evening meeting, under the direction of Mr. Sharpe the pupils both boys and girls presented an athletic exhibition embracing calisthenics, pyramids, races and basket ball in the gymnasium.

Rev. Dean DeGrouchy.

The Rev. Rural Dean DeGrouchy praised the School Home for Girls which the Presbyterians have erected, and which they and the Anglicans are utilizing in common, and expressed the hope that ere long the Church of England may build a similar hostel for boys, in which case its privileges will be extended to Presbyterians boys as freely as the same are enjoyed by the Anglicans in the Girls Residence, but he also stated that the building of this hostel by the Anglican Church was contingent upon their being assured of the future success of the High School, financially and otherwise.

Hon. J. H. Kelly
The Hon. John Hall Kelly argued that this School, of which we are so proud, must be maintained at the present standard in the interest of Protestant education upon the Gaspé Peninsula, and that to this end the Government must continue to grant substantial assistance. Mr. Kelly pled with Dr. Parmelee to exert his influence in this behalf. This the doctor, later in the evening, promised to do.

Mr. P. E. Cote
Mr. Paul Emile Cote M. P. P. followed Mr. Kelly in a speech no less sympathetic, promising his own assistance in every worthy effort the people may make to secure continued and enlarged government grants, in the hope that the whole coast may come to find adequate opportunity for the training of their boys and girls in pre-university study, so that it may be no longer necessary to send any away for instruction before the university grade.

The Principal.
At this point Dr. Parmelee in the name of the people presented Mr. McOuat, for three years principal of the school, with a fitted club bag; and Mr. Gordon in his own name presented him and also Mr. Sharpe who was affectively associated with him on the school staff with a purse of gold. EXPECT NEW TREATY TO DEAL DEATH BLOW TO RUM RUNNING BETWEEN CANADA AND THE U. S.

Unwonted Activity of Rum Runners Along Canadian Border at Present.

Toronto, Aug. 31.—Rum running from Canada to the United States may receive what was probably its death blow when the new treaty between Canada and the United States comes into effect, which prominently accounts for the unwonted activity of rum runners along the Canadian border at the present time, Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the Anti-Saloon League of America, today said.

According to the provisions of the Canadian treaty, which is reciprocal, Mr. Wheeler said, officers of the United States and Canadian Governments shall, on request, furnish information to the other Government concerning clearances when the articles are subject to duty and also when there is ground to suspect that the owner or those in charge of the vessel intend to smuggle goods into the other country.

"Clearance papers will also be required when it is evident from the tonnage, size and so forth, that the vessel in question cannot carry the cargo to its destination. Customs and other authorities on request shall attend trials as witnesses and produce such records as may be required," Mr. Wheeler said.

"The regulations to put this treaty into effect are now pending and we are hopeful that they will help to eliminate the liquor traffic at the border," Mr. Wheeler added.

Regarding conditions in the U. S., Mr. Wheeler said, "The plain fact of the matter is that liquor today is difficult to get, dear to buy and dangerous to drink."
