There were several speakers after Mr. Darling, but they were by no means of a uniform nature. The great stickler with the wholesale men is the insertion of a discharge clause. Some of them do not favor such a clause at all, while others do not even favor an insolvent bill of any kind. WINNIPEG, March 25 .- Amid all the reports that are travelling about, it is a work of the greatest difficulty to distinguish the true from the false. It is certain, however that grossly exaggerated stories have been sent to both the Canadian and United States press. No conflict is known to have taken place, although with the wires cut in several places it is rapossible to describe the exact situation. However, a despatch from Battleford last night says Col, Irvine is expected to form tion with Major Crozier from Carleton to-day at a crossing on the south branch of the Saskatchewan river, opposite Duck Lake, where Riel is supposed to be

They will wait the arrival of the remainder of the battalion and the artillery who expect to leave Friday with

A report was received to-night - that Charles Nolin, a former member of the local legislature here and an epponent of Riel in 1870, had been captured and threatened to be shot. Lieut, Governor Dewdney and Capt. McDougall of Prince Albert returned west to-night with troops. The wires northwest from Humboldt and Prince Albert and Fort Carleton are still down. A courier reports that the mails between these points and for Battleford and Edmonton have been seized by the A prominent Catholic clergyman tele-
