CIVIC ELECTRIC LIGHTING.

FIRE AND LIGHT COMMITTER FUR-THER DISCUSS IT.

Another Report Ordered and the Sab ject Will Not Be Ready For Discussion By Council Before July-Contrac tor Neelon's Appeal Dismissed-Mr. Onge and the Consumption Rospital.

Ald. Stewart presided at the meeting o the Fire and Light Committee yesterday.

The only business was the consideration of Engineer Keating's report on electric street lighting. This has already been published in The World.

Ald. Foster supported the Engineer's recil and its merits tarashed out there. The municipal year was fast advancing, the holidays were at hand, and it was desirable that a decision should be early arrived at, and if favorable the works be commenced at

The chairman said considerable correspon dence on the subject had been received by the secretary. It was important that this should be considered as well as the Engineer's report.

Ald. Bailey moved as an amendment that the secretary report on this correspondence to the next meeting of the committee.

Then the whole facts would be before the committee, who should deal with it before going to council. The latter body would meet next Monday—too early to deal with

meet next Monday—too early to deal with the report.

Ald. Hubbard paid a compliment to the progressive character of this year's council, and would endorse the Engineer's report if his figures could be verified. There was need of economy, and if the ratepsyers' pockets could be saved to the extent the report showed the scheme should be adopted. He thought that power could beo btained from Niagara Falls cheaper than by the city erecting works of its own. He seconded Ald. Foster's reference of the matter to the City Council.

Verify the Figures. Ald. McMurrich urged that the Engineer's figures be verified before the next meeting. He suggested that the pr ent company, in view of the much lower cost of lighting shown by the Engineer, be asked to recast their scale of charges and state the amended terms for a period of five years. In view of the report, the present contract should be greatly modified if the new project were not adopted.

Get All Possible Information. The Chairman said he was not prepared te adopt the report at this meeting. He thought the correspondence would throw more light on the subject and that it and more light on the subject and that it and the report should together be in the hands of the committee at least two days before the next meeting—say in a fortnight. With the secretary's report and that of the Engineer they would be able to give due consideration to the project and make a recommendation to the Council.

The Chairman's Casting Vote.
On division Ald. Bailey and Murray voted for the amendment; Ald. Foster and Hubbard for remitting the scheme to the council. Ald. McMurrich was not present at the time the vote was

aken.

The secretary was requested to have the supplemental report ready in a fortnight. Council will thus not be called on to pronounce on the scheme till the July meeting.
